BOMB THROWING REVIVED IN RUSSIA

(Special from United Press.) Odessa, Oct. 25.—The arrest of seven alleged terrorists here today charged with bomb throwing has brought out the fact that bomb throwing has had a wonderful revival in Russia. The utmost efforts of the police to suppress these outrages seem of little or no avail.

There were 26 successful or attempted outbreaks in Russia and several others in Siberia during September. The situation is especially serious because the terrorists are informing every one concerning the use of explosives and have thus armed the criminal classes with ample knowledge for the manufacture of their own bombs. The outbreaks generally go provided with bombs, finding them more serviceable than arms. With large numbers of experts secretly producing their own bombs police efforts at suppressing the unauthorized possession of explosives have little effect.

OPENS OWN VEINS TO SAVE PATIENT

Dr. P. W. Bill Allows Transfusion of His Blood to William B. Wheeler.

William B. Wheeler, son of the late Nathaniel Wheeler, of the Wheeler & Wilson Manufacturing Company, owes his life to the sacrifice of Dr. Philip W. Bill, who opened his own arteries and allowed the transfusion of a quart of blood into Mr. Wheeler's veins while the latter was in a serious condition from affliction of the stomach. The operation was performed on October 9, but the fact was so safely guarded for fear of publicity that it has just become known.

The operation was performed under the direction of Dr. Charles H. Peck, of the Roosevelt Hospital of New York, who was summoned here for the purpose. Mr. Wheeler four weeks ago had a severe hemorrhage of the stomach, caused by the development of an ulcer, and lost a considerable amount of blood. Dr. Henry Blodgett, the attending physician, saw the necessity of transfusion and Dr. Bill immediately offered to allow the fluid to be taken from him.

The operation was performed at the home of Mr. Wheeler. An incision was made in Dr. Bill's wrist, another in the upper arm of Mr. Wheeler. The two incisions were connected by a tube and about a quart of blood allowed to flow. Dr. Bill refused to take an anaesthetic, although considerably weakened by the operation, he has now entirely recovered.

Mr. Wheeler is much improved. He is well known as a golf player, being a member of the Brooklawn Country Club.
