EFFECT OF JUDGE HOLT'S DECISION

Commencement of Action Against American Sugar Co. Under Anti-Trust Law. LIKE STANDARD OIL CASE

(Special from United Press.) New York, Oct. 27.—The special attorneys for the government and the officials of the American Sugar Refining Company are today carefully examining the decision of Judge Holt, filed with the clerk of the United States District Court late last night.

Representatives of the government insisted today, however, that the decision of Judge Holt bears only on the transactions in connection with the Pennsylvania company, and while it may result in the indictments on record at present being against it, it can have no bearing on the present Grand Jury investigation of the actions of the sugar company officials in conducting the affairs of an entire new set of indictments, growing out of the fraudulent weighing of raw sugar when imported, it is reported to have been set against officials of the trust and will be explained to the court when the jury completes its work.

One effect of the decision of Judge Holt is likely to be the commencement of an auction against the American Sugar company under the anti-trust law, similar in every respect to the proceedings brought against the Standard Oil Company in the Missouri courts. Ever since the Department of Justice began its consideration of the alleged fraudulent weighing cases, its agents have been investigating the manner in which the sugar company opposed competition and it is reported that evidence has been uncovered which indicates violations of the anti-trust law.

Henry L. Stimson, former United States District Attorney, who has been made a special assistant attorney general, declared that he had the case well in hand.

The government may appeal from the decision of Judge Holt. Judge Holt's declaration that the offenses complained of are barred by the statute of limitations was a distinct disappointment to the government which contended that the statute of limitations of the act was a "conspiracy in restraint of trade" and as such the criminal indictments were properly drawn.

He is now a member of the South End football team and of the Sacred Heart Temperance Society.

He studied in the Southington public schools and the Southington high school. He received degrees of A. B. and A. M. from Manhattan college in New York and received his M. D. from Dartmouth Medical school in 1898. He began practicing medicine in 1900. He has a liberal education himself and realizing the importance of education to every man and woman he has taken a live interest in educational matters with which he has been brought in contact during his last term on the board of education. He was elected to the board in 1906.
