"No verdict? Light? Certainly, gentlemen of the jury. You will have light right away. I assure you it was an oversight. You will have your light, and with it I shall have to ask you to resume deliberation now, as there may be a chance to finish the case tonight."

To Recite Saturdays at New Haven High In order that the teachers as well as the students of the New Haven high school may have the full benefit of the recitations in the different studies taken up, a new plan has just been introduced at the school by Dr. Cushing, which, it is thought by local educators, will give a clear understanding to both the pupils and teachers, of the various studies taken up, and which tends to interest the students more in the various studies which they are working at.

Every Saturday at 10 o'clock, a class of pupils on some subject, meets in the building with all the teachers of the high school of that study, and a regular recitation of the students is held and discussed with the pupils. By hearing the opinions of the different teachers of the study, both the pupils and teacher receive a clear idea of the subject discussed.

This system will be followed every Saturday, taking in every department of the school and each study will be fully illustrated. High school teachers are enthusiastic over the plan and the new system, according to Superintendent Beede of the public schools, is one of the best introduced for some time at the New Haven high school. This is said to be the first time in the history of the school that recitations of any sort have been held on Saturdays.

John D. Gives Million To Fight the Hookworm New York, Oct. 29.—A gift of \$1,000,000 by John D. Rockefeller to fight the "hookworm disease" is announced at the offices of the Standard Oil Company in this city.

Prominent educators and scientists, selected in large part from institutions in the South where the disease is prevalent, conferred with Mr. Rockefeller's representatives at the Standard Oil Company's offices 26 Broadway, last Tuesday. As a result of this meeting the Rockefeller Commission for the Eradication of the Hookworm Disease was organized.
