In Letter to Rev. Mr. Millar, Harbor Master Morris Denounces 'Grab'

Also during the hearings upon the proposed repeal of the City Harbor Line the corporation for whose benefit the gift was made and to whose injury it was repealed was always represented and always favored the abolition of the line.

When the line was finally abolished, over the protests of every yacht club on the harbor, and over the protests of the professional sailors who compose Harbor No. 10, many of whose members have sailed the seven seas, and over the heads of the great firms of oyster growers, representing millions of dollars investment, and over the heads of the 30 "natural growers" with their 500 sailing craft of all kinds, it was found that the same corporation was again in possession of the right to fill in the Harbor.
