### TO FIGHT THE DREAD DISEASE CONSUMPTION

Purpose of Society Which was Organized Today.

After a year's successful work in this city against the White Plague the women who banded themselves together to support a visiting nurse to aid the work of the Anti-Tuberculosis Association in this city, held a meeting this afternoon at 3 o'clock for the purpose of organizing an association to be known as the Visiting Nurses' Association of Bridgeport. The organizer of the association, Mrs. Henry Hallam Tweedy, now of New Haven, was present. Miss Mary Finnegan, nurse of the local anti-tuberculosis dispensary, was also at the meeting and gave some helpful suggestions. The organization is composed of influential women who are awake to the necessity of an organized fight against the disease which has broken up so many homes and brought so many to an early grave. These women are giving up their time and money to the work. The secretary and treasurer pro-tem of the association, Mrs. L. T. Warner, said this morning that the results obtained during the past year had been very satisfactory and that a greater activity would follow after a permanent organization had been effected. The meeting was held at 3 o'clock in Warner hall. The organization is in the nature of an auxiliary of the local branch of the Fairfield County Anti-Tuberculosis Association.

#### Night Gunnery At New London

New London, Nov. 3.—On the night of November 17, an interesting experiment in target practice will be made at Fort Terry, Plum Island, when the three inch batteries will fire 38 shots at a moving target illuminated by powerful searchlights. The projectiles will be fitted with the Sempell tracer so that their course can be followed during the entire flight. This is the first time projectiles have been fired at night in the department of the coast and several prominent officers of the artillery branch of the service from Governors Island and Washington are expected to witness the experiment.

#### New Haven Railroad Weighing Mail Carried

New Haven, Nov. 3.—It is because the New Haven road feels that it is not getting all the financial return it is entitled to that the road now is weighing, under the supervision of government officials, all the mail carried on its trains. The mail carried by the road was weighed under the supervision of the postal authorities about one year ago. The job took two months. On the basis of the average weight of the mail carried by the many mail trains on the system the government and the New Haven road entered into a four-year contract. It is stated by postal authorities. These contracts have always run for four years and the mail has been weighed quadriennially for many years. The reweighing work will be done under the management of the New Haven road and it is the first time the company ever undertook this job.

#### KILLED IN AUTO CRASH

Newington, Nov. 3.—An automobile owned and driven by Frederick Downing of 2 Sherman Court, New Britain, skidded and ran into a telegraph pole, while passing through here last night, and Raymond M. Bush of 16 Bradley street, New Britain, was killed and the three other occupants of the car injured.

Downing was driving the machine at a good rate of speed when in passing over a mud puddle it skidded, running into a telegraph pole. The four occupants of the car were thrown out. Bush landed against the pole, fracturing his skull and killing him instantly. Downing received a broken arm. Charles Risley of New Britain, received a sprained ankle and Daniel Flannery of Berlin was severely bruised and shaken up. Downing and Risley were taken to a Hartford hospital and Flannery was taken to his home. Bush was 30 years old and leaves a widow and one child.

#### Evelyn Nesbit Thaw's Brother Jumps Bond

New Haven, Nov. 3.—Howard Nesbit, the brother of Evelyn Nesbit Thaw of New York, has forfeited his bond in the Common Pleas Court. He was charged with obtaining money under false pretenses. Nesbit several weeks ago was caught selling white sapphires in George street for real diamonds. In the City court he was sentenced to 60 days in jail. He appealed and he was placed under bonds of \$500. This bond was furnished by Peter J. McNeerney. It is said Mrs. Thaw stalked the bondsman.
