

TURNING TRAFFIC FROM N. V. CENTRAL

New Haven Road's Westchester Extension Thought to Be for that Purpose.

The acquisition by the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad Company of new trolley interests in Westchester county, New York, together with its plan of extending its New York & Westchester line northward in that county, are said in railroad circles to forecast an important ultimate railroad plan.

By its New York and Westchester line through the Bronx the New Haven will acquire a new entrance into New York which to some extent will divert business from the Grand Central terminal. On the other hand, from the upper end of its Westchester extension only a small gap will remain to be spanned to connect with the New Haven system at or not far from Brewster station.

MME. STEINHEIL IS CONFIDENT OF ACQUITTAL OF SERGEANT COLEY AGAIN AT DESK

(Special from United Press.) Paris, Nov. 8.—Madame Marguerite Steinheil today is confident that she will save her husband from the keel edge of the guillotine's knife by securing an acquittal on the charge of murdering her husband and mother.

Yesterday's respite from the strain of her appearance before a court which appears unnecessarily vengeful gave Madame Steinheil an opportunity to recuperate and she appeared today with renewed strength.

The position of the accused woman today is stronger than it was before the state began its efforts to prove her a murderer. She herself says that nothing has been proven against her despite the inequitable practices of the presiding judge who is also her prosecutor and the testimony of the witnesses was manifestly vengeful.

Today's proceedings opened with another victory of Madame Steinheil in the testimony of M. Acheray, family physician of the Steinheils, who testified that he was intimately acquainted with the family life of the Steinheils and that he knew that Mme. Steinheil was innocent of the crime.

M. Bordere, admitted lover of Mme. Steinheil, who installed her in country place Verte Logis, declared in his testimony that he had never dreamed of marriage as a result of their relations. The prosecution has held that Mme. Steinheil's motive for the murder of her husband was her desire to marry Bordere.

M. Bordere will soon be called to the stand. The prison authorities at the Hotel de Ville, where Madame Steinheil is confined today, announced that a sale of embroideries, the work of the accused woman during her long imprisonment will be held at the prison soon.

M. Billthazar, a physician and criminologist who visited the Steinheil home in the morning, testified that he created a sensation by saying that he was sure Madame Steinheil murdered her husband and mother. He gave no facts in the support of this belief, however, and admitted that Madame Steinheil, under a special effort of strength, barely equalled the standards for a woman of her age.

SENSATIONAL SMASH IN COTTON FUTURE

(Special from United Press.) New York, Nov. 8.—A smash in cotton future, quite as sensational as any since the record movement of the place at the opening of the cotton market to-day. Prices generally broke from 22 to 33 points while at one time on the 10th January was off 4 points from Saturday's close.

December sold under 14 cents on the call and later January also fell below the level.

AMERICAN T. & S. CO. SUED FOR \$25,000

National Metal Fabric Company Alleges Violation of Contract to Deliver Certain Goods.

The American Tube & Stamping Company of this city, have been named as defendants in a civil suit for \$25,000 brought by the National Metal Fabric Company of New York for alleged violation of contract.

The complaint alleges that in 1906 the defendant agreed to make and retain patent expanded metal for the Clark Caster Company of Plainville, Conn.

The contract was assigned with the contract of the defendant to the plaintiff, The Clark Co., entered into an agreement with the Edward Darby & Sons Company of Philadelphia which later purchased larger quantities of the goods.

The plaintiffs manufactured dies and other mechanisms which they cannot use because of the failure of the local company to deliver any of the metal. These they value at \$11,000. The total loss by failure to perform the contract they place at \$25,000.
