With the opening of the Metropolitan Opera on Nov. 15 New York's season of winter gaiety will be on in earnest. Already the New Theater and the Manhattan Opera are drawing honors and attracting the patronage not only of those New Yorkers who enjoy the highest art in music and the drama, but thousands of visitors as well who

Settled Out of Court. The trial of the action of A. H. It Would Not Pay. In a letter from Vice President Townley of the Consolidated road to H. S. Dormitzer of Hotchkissville asking for a trolley extension to that place, the former says: "The indications of the probable earning capacity of such an extension as you advocate, drawn from the earnings up to date of the Waterbury-Woodbury line, are that such an extension would not be profitable. I know of no promise to build the line. On the contrary, I believe our company has greatly benefited all the residents of Hotchkissville by building the line to Woodbury. Woodbury line has not as yet proved itself supporting."
