## SANGER RELIES ON NATURE'S WEAPONS

Police Board on Point of Calling Sergeant For Supposed Negligence.

Commissioners Believed He Was Unarmed When He Engaged in Scuffle — He Says He Had Weapons But Did Not Need Them.

Sergeant Garrie Sanger came within an ace of being called to account by the commissioners last night for his supposed failure to have his billy or gun with him Saturday night when he had a scuffle with a disturber of the peace at Golden Hill and Main streets. Commissioner Hurley brought up the matter, recommending that steps be taken to learn some of the people who were in the crowd at the time and arrest them for not doing their duty by refusing to assist the sergeant.

Commissioner Hurley insisted that the matter be taken up from a different point of view and said in his opinion no officer should expect any constabulary given the matter of the board. He said a patrolman was on duty 24 hours a day and ought always to be armed for business. He said further that the sergeant required a patrolman to always carry his gun, and he should carry his billy always, according to the idea of Commissioner Coughlin.

Commissioner Hurley was for having the president speak to Sergeant Sanger privately about the matter, but opposed the idea of any publicity given the matter. Commissioner Hurley insisted that the president remind the men tonight about always being properly armed, but when the president refused for a motion Commissioner Coughlin responded "Move we adjourn." This was done and the matter remained unsettled.

Today Sergeant Sanger said he had both his billy and gun at the time of the trouble, but he did not feel called upon to use either. He said he had a sword to subdue his prisoner.

## A WARM ARGUMENT

From the President of the National Model License League

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 15.—The National Model License League last week began the mailing of 45,000 letters to ministers throughout the United States in which attention is called to an editorial in the "Biblical World," of Chicago University, in which is raised the question "Is the Bible a Compendium of Ethics?"

The letter is written by T. M. Gilmore, president of the National Model License League, an organization of liquor interests and allied trades advocating a form of law designed to take the liquor question out of politics and to put the law breakers out of the liquor business. The letter is as follows:

"I have addressed you and other ministers on the relation of the liquor problem to the Bible from which you derive your authority as a spiritual and moral authority on each occasion some of the ministers have denounced me as a blasphemer. This denunciation does not hurt me except in one way, and that is that it is a mere reason to check my own application of the reasoning faculties and regard the question of the solution of the liquor problem."

"How can we teach total abstinence from a Bible which represents Jesus as partaking of all feasts, and which even tells how He drank wine produced from water on one occasion, when the supply fell short?"

"The question is not of my framing of the question, but of the editor of the 'Biblical World,' of Chicago, who is announced that this question represents the views of all of the editors of the journal in which it is asked. These men have at their command all of the evidence concerning the subject matter of the Bible. In asking this question they ignore the unfettered wine theory as unworthy of the consideration of scholars."

"In accordance with their custom some of the ministers will now proceed to denounce the editors of the 'Biblical World.' In so doing they manifest the feelings of Mr. John D. Rockefeller, who has given millions to support the university of Chicago as a Baptist educational institution, and who has donated hundreds of thousands of dollars to the Anti-Saloon League but after all the questions will remain until truthfully answered."

"The issue must be met fairly, squarely, honestly, intelligently. Surely this is not too much to ask of ministers. If the example of Christ is not to be accepted as a guide for the moral and enlightened element of society, what example will be substituted?"

"If Christ imperatively made the use of wine a part of the most sacred rite of Christianity, what authority is there for offering a substitute?"

"If you teach that Christians cannot trust themselves to overcome worldly desires and temptations, how can you hope to build up a robust, sin-defying faith in the word of God?"

"Do you believe that Christ was ignorant of the intoxicating power of wine and that the wine-miracle was a blunder?"

"Do you believe that Christ made unfermented grape juice, but forgot or neglected to call attention to the difference between unfermented grape juice and wine?"

"Don't you think it is impertinent for men who cannot explain why the forbidden fruit was put in the Garden of Eden to try to improve on the teachings of the Son of the Omniscient?"

"I read not long ago in the 'National Prohibitionist' that Christ was ignorant of the germ theory and the laws of hygiene, and that He could not have been aware of the effects of alcohol on the anatomy of man. Can you accept that as a reason for changing the character of the sacrament?"

"Isn't it better to believe that Christ was ignorant of the evil of intemperance (had total societies in his days) and that He, in His wisdom, made wine a part of the sacrament, or to show that the Christian can overcome any temptation?"

"I am fully aware that I will be charged with an attempt to make Christ responsible for the lawless saloon, but I am as fully aware that those who make the charge know that the charge is false."

"I am earnestly asking assistance of all good men in putting the lawbreakers out of the liquor business. I have written as far as to offer my support to a movement to put a penalty on the use of liquor in 'dry' territory. If the people want to abolish the use of liquor they have the power to put themselves on record to that effect."

"But the prohibitionists say that such a law would break down the prohibition movement. They say that

they could not win a prohibition election if prohibition put a penalty on the use of liquor.

"The liquor problem is not easy to solve, but there are several established facts that must be taken into consideration if any real progress is to be made in the prohibitionists' fight. It is worse than useless to pass laws that will not be supported by public sentiment. How can prohibition be maintained if the prohibitionists insist on purchasing alcoholic liquors?"

"The only way to prevent violation of the letter and spirit of prohibitory law is to prevent the use of liquor, which is prohibited, and it is admitted that a law to prevent the use of liquor would neither be favored nor obeyed."

MILLIONS LOST BY INVESTORS IN RUSSIA (Special from United Press.) St. Petersburg, Nov. 15.—A serious financial scandal has resulted from the operations of a syndicate of Rigo capitalists with the result that seven directors of the Great Northern Glass Manufacturing Company, including two Germans commonly rated as millionaires, are under arrest while warrants have been issued for 11 others. Bail has been refused those under arrest and it is announced by the government officials that the fraudulent practices have resulted in the loss of millions by investors throughout Russia. It is intimated that at the trials evidence will be produced showing the complicity of certain high officials with the swindlers.
