## "POP" CONCERT AT Y. M. C. A. SUNDAY

Association Devises Means by Which Young Men May Agreeably Pass Entire Sunday Afternoon.

A unique experiment was tried last year at the Young Men's Christian Association. That organization realized that there were hundreds of men who found Sunday afternoon a drag on their hands and felt that it was not enough for them to furnish a good speaker for just one, but that they ought to have an entertainment to the best possible advantage for the entire afternoon. For Sunday an unusually fine program has been planned, which includes an address by one of the high officers of the United States Navy. The plan for Sunday afternoon is for Hutzel's Orchestra to play from 2:30 to 3:30 in the most informal manner so that men are at liberty to get together and visit in groups, lounge in the big easy chairs or take periodicals from the reading room and enjoy their reading and music at the same time. In short the idea of the Association is for men to feel absolutely free and at home during this "pop" concert. At 3:30 the meeting will begin with a lively song service and special selections by Mrs. Martin, the beloved soprano of the South Congregational church. The speaker will be Commodore Wadhams, of the Navy, who will speak on "Elements of Success."

## GEMS WORTH \$35,000 TAKEN ON AUTO RIDE

New York, Nov. 18.—Frank Milhening of the firm of J. Milhening, manufacturing jewelers of 185 State street, Chicago, completed yesterday a business trip of several days which he made to this city. He had been stopping at the Herald Square Hotel, and when it came time to start for the city he ordered the porter to put in a taxicab and to wait with it until he had settled his account at the desk. The porter carried the trunk out, but he failed to wait, and presently a man accompanied by two women, stepped from the hotel, and entering the taxicab, said to John Dunphy, the chauffeur: "All right, driver. Go to Houston street and the Bowery."

Dunphy started his car, and some minutes later pulled up there. His eyes alighted, telling him to wait, and a few minutes later re-entered the car and ordered Dunphy to drive to 402 Broadway. Again they left the cab with orders to Dunphy to wait, and some minutes later entered it again, this time telling the chauffeur to go to 135th street and Willis avenue in the Bronx. The women left the cab, and the man ordered Dunphy to drive to 166th street and Willis avenue.

In the Herald Square Hotel, meantime, Mr. Milhening had discovered that the cab on which his trunk full of jewels rested had driven away. He summoned the porter, who told of having placed the trunk on the cab and admitted having left it there. The clerk and proprietor were called in an effort to learn what cab it was which had been engaged for Mr. Milhening. No one could tell, and in a panic the jeweler called up police headquarters. Over the telephone he explained that the trunk was extremely valuable and begged that everything possible be done to regain it. Lieut. Mannion consoled him with the opinion that the trunk would be recovered shortly, and then sent Detectives Griffith and Haley to the hotel on the run.

They found Mr. Milhening almost distracted by his loss and were fruitively questioning the negro porter for about the tenth time when Dunphy hurried into the hotel, somewhat alarmed and entirely snappy. He made for the porter demanding to know why a trunk had been put on his taxicab, and in the midst of the porter's explanations was seized by Mr. Milhening, who demanded to know whether the trunk was safe and what had happened to it.

"The trunk's all right," declared Dunphy. "It's out on the cab now."

Then he told the story of the ride to the Bronx, and said that at 166th street his last passenger had alighted and asked for his bill. It was \$7, which Dunphy said the man paid and was about to step into his house when the chauffeur called him back.

"How about the trunk here?" said Dunphy. "What'll I do with that?"

"What trunk?" replied his fare. "It's nothing to me what you do with it. It isn't mine."

Then it was that Dunphy started back post haste for the Herald Square Hotel.
