FIRST ACCIDENT IN THE VIADUCT

The first accident reported in which a trolley car coming along the new viaduct leading to and from Union station in New Haven has collided with a vehicle crossing the viaduct on one of the public streets occurred shortly after midnight Saturday night. One of the cars from the railroad station filled with a merry crowd that had just returned from the football game in Boston, started from the station at the arrival of the train. As the car was coming along the viaduct at Water street it struck squarely one of the big express teams of the Peck and Bishop company.

The impact of the collision was such that the entire front of the trolley car was demolished although the motor was not without injury. The passengers were given a violent shock but none of them was injured. The team was not damaged but the car had to be sent into the barn for repairs.

High School Football Player Knocked Out

Middletown, Nov. 22.—Arnold Purple, the local high school football player who is suffering from concussion of the brain as the result of injuries received Saturday in a game with the Meriden high school team regained consciousness yesterday, but his condition is considered critical by the attending physicians.

Purple, whose home is in East Hampton, is a sophomore and has played left end on the team during the past season. In Saturday's game he was thrown heavily to the ground in making a tackle his head striking a stone. He continued playing through in a dazed condition until he was kicked in the head during a scrimmage and rendered unconscious. He was taken to the home of Dr. F. H. Sage, where he remained unconscious until Sunday. On recovering consciousness he was unable to remember anything that transpired from the time of his leaving his home Saturday morning until waking to find himself in the Sage home.

He will remain with Dr. Sage until his condition warrants his being removed to a hospital.
