LUMBER OUTPUT WORTH MORE THAN HALF BILLION

Washington, Nov. 22.—Washington, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas and Wisconsin, in the order named, cut about the Big Five in producing the country's lumber supply, whose valuation for last year runs far above the half billion dollar mark.

While the total valuation of the lumber, lath and shingle production reached \$51,545,640, this amount represents a decrease of twenty-three per cent. under the previous year's output. The number of mills reporting was 3,231 and those manufacturing 32,224,300,000 feet of lumber, valued at \$50,575,822 and 2,588,234,000 lath valued at \$8,791,323, while the shingle makers turned out 12,156,183,000 shingles valued at \$2,178,490.

Yellow pine of the South which has been far in the lead in the lumber production, thus maintained its supremacy last year, contributing slightly more than thirty-three per cent. of the total cut from all kinds of timbers. It was ranked second and white pine third. Practically all kinds showed a marked decrease out and for the year, the only exception being a falling off of fifteen, twenty-two and twenty per cent., respectively. Audience Far too Small Grets Noted Woman Lecturer at Memorial Concert and Address Under Auspices of Division, No. 2, A. O. U.

The audience that greeted Miss Charlotte Molyneux Holloway at Polk's Theatre last evening was much smaller than the merit of the lecture and concert provided by Division No. 2, A. O. U. warranted. Wheelock, expert in the value of timbers, representing the Bureau of the Census, and R. S. Kellogg, assistant forester, and A. H. Peterson, forest assistant, representing the United States Forest Service.

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
