## SPLENDID MOTION PICTURES OF FIGHT EVOKE ENTHUSIASM

Johnson-Ketchell Encounter Reproduced at Jackson's.

The Johnson-Ketchell fight pictures at Jackson's theatre attracted a big gathering of enthusiasts yesterday. The best motion pictures of the kind ever taken, they revealed the exciting incidents of the famous battle to better advantage no doubt than they were shown to a large number of spectators at the actual ringside. The audience warmed to the game display of Ketchell, a little fellow beside the burly black man, and at the same time they could not but admire the flashes of the negro's champion.

Usually the motion pictures of a fight disclose some features that have been overlooked in the hastily written opinions of the men at the ringside. But the Johnson-Ketchell fight seems to be an exception. Ketchell's pluck and endurance and Johnson's generalship came in for more notice than any other feature. The pictures show these things, and as the features come, the audience, Edward J. Farrell, himself announces them in advance, bringing out the striking points effectively and entertainingly.

The tenth round, with its thrilling knock-out, evoked storm of applause. It is apparent that Ketchell is confident of himself and expects to receive the knockout. He had landed a terrific blow on the side of Johnson's head, flooring him, and the referee with a quick motion rushed forward, with little defence and Johnson received him with a terrific blow of his right, Ketchell fell back and the force of Johnson's thrust carried the negro over his prostrate body, while Ketchell is counted out. The pictures remain to-day and to-night.

O'Neill's name was the only one placed in nomination and was warmly endorsed by Alderman J. H. McMurray who has been mentioned as a possible candidate for the position.

Thomas Cleary of the Eleventh district was the caucus choice for page. There were ten candidates for the place and it looked like anyone's job until the fifth ballot had been taken. On the fourth ballot Cleary had six, William A. Sullivan of the Seventh district had five and there was one scattering. On the next ballot Cleary had seven votes and was declared elected.

The Clinton A. C. played the Black Rock Jrs., a no score game Sunday at the Acill Works.


