WILL OF SIDNEY TERRY

Life Use of Considerable Estate Goes to Widow.

The will of the late Sidney Terry was admitted to probate this morning. The deceased gives the life use of his entire estate which is estimated to be worth many thousands of dollars to his wife. After the death of the widow the executors are to divide the estate equally between the three children, Benjamin W. Terry, Isaiah F. Terry, and Collis G. Terry.

The executor is a brother of Capt. W. M. Terry, and for many years the owner of a profitable market gardening business in this city. It is believed that the size of his estate will be a surprise. He was active up to the time of his death, and for years was a familiar figure about the center of the city. The executors are Jacob Cuyler Shaw and Isaiah F. Terry. Louis B. Sammis and Joseph Smith were appointed appraisers.

DOUBLE TRAGEDY RESULT OF TWO DIVORCE SUITS

(Special from United Press.) Oakland, Cal., Dec. 10.—This city is greatly excited today over the shooting last night of Dr. Eugene Wood, by Gabriel Jacobs, who later committed suicide. The shooting was dramatic, and followed a series of sensational events.

Last night Dr. Wood went down into the heart of the business district in an automobile with Mrs. Jacobs. While hundreds of Christmas shoppers crowded the street, Jacobs approached the automobile and shot Dr. Wood to death. Jacobs then fired two shots at his wife, neither of which took effect. Portland, citizens rushed toward him but Jacobs turned the revolver upon himself and fired a shot into his brain, dying instantly.

VESSEL SINKS, CREW PICKED UP

(Special from United Press.) Portsmouth, N. H., Dec. 10.—Taking to the boats, Captain Duffie and six men, the crew of the big ocean-going tug Portland, escaped death today when the vessel went head on Stone's Rock off York Harbor, Me. The captain and crew deserted their vessel only when she slipped off the rock and sank in 14 fathoms of water. They were picked up by the tug M. Mitchell Davis and brought to this port. The tug Portland, which was valued at \$20,000, was owned by the Central Wharf Towboat Company of Portland, Me. She will be a total loss. The crew of the Wood End Life Saving Station put out to the Portland when the news of her wreck was first received but reached the vessel only in time to see her crew picked up by the Davis.

Hickey Stopped Runaway Horses

John L. Hickey, the expressman, made a daring stop of a runaway yesterday afternoon in Norman street. With a single bound from the seat of his express wagon he reached the roadway and with a few additional steps seized the bridle of a badly frightened horse owned by John Lund the liverman and attached to a hand-saw coupe. The horse, which was on its mad career before any damage to either animal or vehicle. The driver of the rig left it standing for a few seconds in front of the Wood avenue in Norman street by keeping in the center of the roadway.

PROF. STROMGREN SCOUTS AFFIDAVITS OF LOOSE AND DUNKLE AGAINST DR. COOK

(Special from United Press.) Copenhagen, Dec. 10.—Professor Elis Stromgren of the department of astronomy in the University of Copenhagen, who will be president of the eighth Polar expedition, today announced the data of Frederick A. Cook's polar explorations, came out unequivocally today in expressing his skepticism of the affidavits made by Captain W. L. Loose and George H. Durlke who say they faked the records that Cook is to present to the committee.

Professor Stromgren would not permit himself to be quoted directly but he intimated that the charges in the affidavits fall of their own weight when they assert that Dr. Cook showed his ignorance of astronomical observations. He said that before Dr. Cook sailed from Copenhagen for America the explorer talked for several hours with Scandinavian astronomers about the very things of which his accusers charge him with being grossly ignorant and thoroughly satisfied the scientists of his complete competency. It is pointed out here that many of those upon whom Dr. Cook has the right to rely for substantiation of his claims both as to the North Pole and to Mt. McKinley have been "tampered with" and the opinion is expressed that the fortunes of the expedition are being "manufactured" evidence against Cook.

Walter Lonsdale, private secretary of Dr. Cook, said today that Cook was tricked into believing that Captain Loose was an expert astronomer and submitted his records to him for no other purpose than to get his expert opinion. "Dr. Cook withdrew his records within a few days," Lonsdale said, "on account of Loose's personal habits and general incompetency." The Politikan today quotes Knude Rasmussen as saying that "Captain Loose's opinions are foolish and childish."
