

COMMON COUNCIL MEETING

(Official.) (Concluded.) East on land of H. J. Seelye one hundred (100) feet South on Laurel avenue forty-three and five-tenths (43.5) feet, and west on land of Wilbur A. Smith and Arthur J. Cable one hundred (100) feet, be released and conveyed, by quit claim deed by the said City of Bridgeport to the said Stephen P. Boucher, be and he hereby appoints the agent for and on behalf of and in the name of said city to execute a quit claim deed of said property to said Farmly S. Clapp.

The City Attorney reported upon the petition of the Bridgeport Hospital for release of lien upon land owned by it on Madison avenue, be granted upon the giving of a bond to terminate the lien of the Bridgeport with sufficient assets, in double the amount of said lien, condition for the payment of the amount of said lien, with interest and costs. If it shall be decided by the court that said lien is a valid lien against the property of said Hospital, and that said Hospital is liable to pay said assessment secured by said lien, said bond to be approved by the city attorney, and that upon the giving of said bond with the city auditor, he is hereby authorized and directed to release said lien of record.

The City Engineer reported and recommended for adoption, the following resolution regarding the establishment of grade on Boston avenue at 118 1/2 appears by resolution adopted May 3, 1909.

Resolved, That a hearing be and hereby is called, to be held and heard in relation to establishing said grade, also to examine said maps on file relative to said grade, at 118 1/2, to be referred to the Committee on Streets and Sidewalks.

Adopted. The Special Committee appointed relative to the layout, alteration, exchange, discontinuance, enlargement of Congress street, by resolution adopted November 1, 1909, reported that they have, in compliance with said resolution and the provisions of the act, approved, altered, enlarged, exchanged, discontinued, enlarged Congress street, in accordance with the particular description, alterations, maps and surveys therewith submitted, printed and made part hereof.

Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Main street, at its intersection with the easterly line of Congress street, then straight and easterly, parallel with the easterly line of Congress street, to the intersection of the easterly line of Congress street and the easterly line of the following resolution:

Resolved, That the above and foregoing report be and is hereby approved, and referred to the Board of Appraisal of Benefits and Damages to estimate benefits and damages resulting from said layout.

Report of Light Investigation Committee. The undersigned, a committee appointed by his honor, Henry Lee, Mayor of Bridgeport, to investigate the cost of production of electric light for lighting in the city of Bridgeport, pursuant to a resolution passed by the Common Council on the 17th day of May, 1909, respectfully report as follows:

On March 21st, 1906, the city of Bridgeport and the United Illuminating Company entered into a contract providing for the lighting of the public streets of Bridgeport for a period of five years, and fixing the rate for the same at \$7.25 per lamp, which price should be reduced to 2 1/2 cents a night or \$7.47 a year, when the total number of lights should reach 600. This contract provided for a further reduction, contingent upon a lower cost of production, was provided for in paragraph 12 of said contract, which reads as follows:

"It is hereby agreed that if the cost of production of electricity for the operation of lamps as specified herein be cheaper than the price provided for in this contract, that said Company will reduce to said city the price of said lamps in a sum equal to the reduced price of production as aforesaid."

COST NO LOWER. In the investigation of your committee into the general conditions existing at the plant of the United Illuminating Company, and the plan for the lighting of the city of Bridgeport, your committee found as a fact that the equipment used in the production of electric light for street lighting was approximately the same as upon said March 21, 1906, the date of the execution of the contract. In these circumstances, and in consideration of the fact that the cost of coal and labor has increased rather than diminished, it became apparent that there was no reduction in the cost of electricity for lighting in the city the legal rights to enforce a lower rate than that fixed in said contract.

Your committee considered, however, that an investigation into the cost of arc lighting and an examination into the relative economy of improved methods of arc lighting would at least furnish information by means of which a more favorable contract could be secured at the termination of the existing contract, and at the present time. With this purpose in view, your committee investigated the question individually, and appointed and held a public hearing in the council chamber on August 24th, 1909. A stenographic copy of the proceedings at this hearing has been filed with this report. On the 13th of October, 1909, the United Illuminating Company submitted to your committee a communication which reads as follows:

TO THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE CONTRACT BETWEEN THE CITY OF BRIDGEPORT AND THE UNITED ILLUMINATING COMPANY.

Gentlemen:—The United Illuminating Company has installed and tried out in New Haven and Bridgeport a large number of luminous arc or magnette lamps, and believing that the same will result from their general use, hereby makes the following proposition:

That the present contract between the City of Bridgeport and the Company be superseded by a new contract to take effect upon the execution of the same, which contract is to provide for the installation in the place of lamps now used of luminous arc or magnette lamps, using four amperes at not less than 72 volts at the arc at the following prices: For 600 lamps, which is approximately the number now used by the city, at the rate of 20 cents per night per lamp for all-night service, or 10 cents per lamp per night. When the number of lights in use exceeds 700 the price to be at the rate of 19 1/2 cents per lamp per night for all-night service, and 9 1/2 cents per lamp per night for day service. This contract to continue in force until the expiration of a six months' notice in writing by either party to the other, and to terminate upon the expiration provided that no such notice shall be given by either party to the other within 15 months from the execution of the contract. The terms of the contract to be agreed upon between the representatives of the city and the Company.

The luminous arc or magnette lamps above provided for are of the same capacity as those which have been lately experimentally used in the City of Bridgeport.

We have endeavored in making the above proposition to meet the wishes of the city for arc lights at a less price than that provided for in the present contract, and to meet as far as possible the desires of your committee.

(Signed) The United Illuminating Co., By Alfred E. O'Neill, its Attorney. Bridgeport, Ct., Oct. 15, 1909. Your committee has no further power or authority in the premises, except to submit this proposition with such facts appertaining thereto as may be in the possession of the committee, and such recommendations as it may deem advisable.

This offer has been submitted to Mr. A. E. Winchester, the manager of the municipal lighting plant at South End, who has acted in the capacity of consulting engineer of the committee, and his opinion is submitted with this report for two voting districts in the twelfth voting district of the city.

Referred to the Committee on Ordinances. By Alderman Jackson. Resolved, That a committee of five which will consist of four members of the Board of Public Works, and one as chairman, shall be appointed to confer with Charles H. Chapman, local Superintendent of the New York New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company who controls the Connecticut company with a view of securing adequate trolley service for the city of Bridgeport and adjacent territory.

Adopted. In compliance with the foregoing resolution the Mayor appointed Alderman McMurray, Chairman; Jackson and Bulfinch, members. By Alderman Padlock:

Resolved, That the Director of Public Works be and he is hereby authorized to grade Freeman street its entire length. Referred to the Committee on Streets and Sidewalks. By Alderman Brady:

Resolved, That permission be granted to Carl Jablonski to move a frame one story building 10x20 feet from the corner of Broad street and Elm street, upon motion the Board did then adjourn until Monday evening, December 20, 1909, at 8 p. m.
