Fast Waterbury Boy Won From Ward Hayes

In a three mile roller skating race last evening at the Park City rink, Ward Hayes the fast Bridgeport boy lost to H. H. Chatfield the pride of Waterbury. Hayes looked like a winner in the first two miles of skating he also keeping the lead for the two miles and when the gun was fired for the third mile a crowd of five hundred was right on the track cheering the Bridgeport boy which got Hayes so excited that in all the cheering he missed his run on one of the corners and fell. It was in the fourth lap of the third mile and getting up like a wizard tore after his opponent gaining a little of what he had lost and in the 15th lap of the same mile the crowd came back which made him lose his head and caused Hayes to fall on the same corner putting him out of the race. Chatfield finished the

race making the time very slow 9 minutes and 37 seconds. If Hayes had not fallen he would have won out easily as the Brass City had was all in and he had to go at a slow clip in order to finish his race.

SKATING BECOMES POPULAR ICE COVERS LOCAL PONDS.

Safe skating in all quarters of the city where that popular form of mid-winter sport may be indulged in has attracted throngs to the larger ponds. The ice is now four to six inches thick in most ponds, and amply strong to support any number of skaters. Within the week the hardware stores have been selling skates at a rapid rate. Berkshire pond is the most popular resort of the skaters and hundreds may be seen there after-noon and evening. Parrott's, which was once a popular skating resort, is no longer much frequented, changes in the pond having left little space for the recreation. Bunnell's pond, at Beardsley park,

is covered with heavy ice, but skating is prohibited by the Bridgeport Hydraulic Co., the water being of the city's system of reservoirs.

MOTHER WEEPS BECAUSE SON IS SENT TO JAIL.

While the mother of Albert Duboid was weeping yesterday and preparing to draw from the savings bank \$200 with which to procure means for his defense, he declared "I would rather go to jail than have my mother spend her savings." Then he insisted upon pleading guilty. This statement was made today by the young man's lawyer, John P. Gray. Duboid is one of the boys who while intoxicated assaulted Mrs. Catherine Melody of Stratford. He must spend many months in jail. After sentence was imposed Mrs. Duboid left court on the arm of another son, weeping bitterly.

SCHOOL CHILDREN RAISE OVER \$60 FOR XMAS CHARITY

FINE RESPONSE MADE BY THE YOUNGSTERS AT BARNUM SCHOOL.

Treasurer Glenn to Fill Role of Saint Nicholas to the Needy in the School District—Money to be Spent For Shoes and Warm Clothing.

That the pupils of the Barnum school have amassed \$60.35 for their Christmas fund since Thanksgiving was made known by the principal, Miss Carrie A. Seelye, at the annual Christmas holiday gathering in the assembly hall of the school this afternoon. In keeping with the usual custom, Miss Seelye summoned all the pupils into the big assembly room during the afternoon session, and then disclosed the amount of the fund.

The sum was raised principally by contributions of pennies from day to day, the deposits being made in banks placed in the various rooms. This afternoon Miss Seelye told the pupils she had deposited the money in a bank and she will check it out as fast as disbursements are made to deserving poor families in the Barnum school district.

Treasurer Russell E. Glenn will fill the role of Saint Nicholas to the needy in the vicinity of the school. He is entrusted with the task of investigating cases of deserving poverty, and upon his recommendation purchases of shoes, underwear, and coats are made from the children's Christmas fund.
