(Special from United Press.) Berlin, Jan. 5.—It was learned today that the Kaiser, for the first time in his reign, refused to make a speech at the New Year's dinner he gave to the commanding generals of the German army, which was given this year in the Berlin Palace.

Balfour Lugs in German War Scare to Beat Budget

(Special from United Press.) London, Jan. 5.—"The German war scare" bids fair to be the biggest asset possessed by the conservatives in the present campaign, says Premier Balfour, in his speech at Henley, last night, threw off all reserve and frankly admitted that the only thing that could save England from a disastrous defeat with Germany was the up-building of the navy to such a point that it would be clearly out of the question for another nation to attack it.

Balfour speech, while rather pessimistic in vein, declared that he did not believe there would be war between England and Germany, but he based the belief on no more hopeful sign than that "England would be able to meet the necessity of guarding against Germany and continue her naval expansion until it would be suicide for any nation to go to war with England."

FEAR SMALLPOX CASE STAMFORD COOK AT ISLAND HOSPITAL UNDER WATCH NEW HAVEN. New Haven, Jan. 5.—At the contagious disease cottage at Springside home the Health board has isolated August Hornig, a Stamford man, who was formerly a cook, it is said, in the small-pox hospital in that city. Hornig was taken sick on the street and it was feared he had smallpox, so he was sent to the cottage to await the development of the case. Dr. Wright said last night that he was doubtful if the case would prove to be one of smallpox, but that he would keep the man a few days and watch him to be on the safe side.

POLICE SERGEANTS SHORN OF OFFICE At a long session of the New Haven Board of Police Commissioners, most of which was executive and at which all the members of the board were present, with the exception of James S. Maxwell, Patrick F. Cannon and Thomas F. Doughan, the two patrolmen from the central station who were named sergeants under Mayor Martin's administration, were reduced again to the ranks by a formal vote making them grade A patrolmen, last night. The resolution was passed in consideration of the fact that it appears that the attempt to promote both men was illegal, and that they were not properly raised from their position as patrolmen.
