

FORWARD PASS IS RETAINED BY COMMITTEE

Without it Under New Restrictions Scoring Would Be Very Difficult.

New York, May 14.—The intercollegiate football rules committee at a meeting here has decided to retain the forward pass unrestricted.

The working out of the details of the new games was left in the hands of a sub-committee composed of Walter Camp of Yale, Dr. Carl Williams of the University of Pennsylvania, and Percy D. Houghton of Harvard.

It was felt that, having weakened the offense by the new rules previously adopted, some method had to be invented to strengthen the offense.

At former sessions the committee adopted six rules. They are that the offense must keep seven men on the line of scrimmage; prohibition of the diving tackle; permitting quarterback runs to be made through any part of the line; that an onside kick must go 20 yards to be onside; prohibiting pushing or pulling of players or interlocking interference on Saturdays and Sundays in years.

CY MILLER'S RIGHT DIGITS SAVE CONTEST FOR MECHANICS

As a result of the big win yesterday in Waterbury, the Mechanics are safely lodged in first place today. There may be changes tonight as the same clubs are due for a session this afternoon at Newfield park.

Today, all over town, the fans are lauding the work of the Mechanics to the highest. There are a few of the players who come in for a little more talk than the others, but every man contributed to that great victory.

Chief Snyder, who held the Finnegans first the Finnegans yesterday took the game, not enough can be done. The Waterbury Republican has the following to say about the game.

"In a battle that was worthy in all respects of two teams fighting for first place in a pennant race, the Bridgeport mechanics yesterday took the measure of the Finnegans at Baldwinville. The final score was 5 to 4 in favor of the down-valley diamond artists.

The catch was made by the Mechanics ever turned in at the local park and came at most critical time, so critical that if the ball had gotten beyond the Bridgeport third baseman, Waterbury, and not Bridgeport, would be leading the league this morning.

The bases choked and two men out in the fifth inning. Snyder hit the ball on the nose and started it on a line to that section in left field which always yields a double, sometimes a triple to the right of Miller and a trifle beyond his ordinary reach, but he took a hop into the air, shot out the bare fin and the victor glared at the pitcher.
