IN POISONED SPRING WATER

Thirsty Religious Paraders Drink Freely-Three Die and Hundreds Fatally

TRACES OF POISON FOUND

Priests Turn from the Religious Ceramony to Care for Stricken Ones

(Special from United Press.) Vienna, June 20-Poisoning of the waters of a spring near Trau in Dal-matia is responsible for the immediate death of three religious processionists, the probable fatal illness of 200 others and the serious condition of at least another hundred. The hospitals at Trau are today crowded with the victims of the poisoning outrage. The day was insufferably hot and the processionists broke ranks and rushed to the spring. In the disorder one of the attendants at the spring was trampled

Fifty of the processionists were placed under arrest charged with the murder of the attendants. Traces of poison were found.
