GOLF CLUB DINNER

ROASTED BY PARSON; CALL IT DISGRACEFUL

(Special from Urted Press.) Chicago, Sept. 23--That a banquet, over which Federal Judge Peter S. Grosscup presided, at the Exmore Golf Club, was a "disgraceful carousal," is the allegation of Rev. Thomas Quayle, of Lake Forest. The minister is secretary of the Lake County Law & Order League and has a written complaint filed with State's Attorney Dady of Waukegan, says the club violated the law by selling liquors to its members.

But it was Saturday night's dinner that aroused the ire of the Rev. Quayle most. It has been advertised as a "fellowship banquet" and many of the most prominent men in Chicago, members of the club, attended. In his complaint Rev. Quayle asserts that at the banquet many of the men were "in a state of intoxication," some "for the first time in their lives." He demanded the prosecution of the offenders.

Walter E. Carr, president of the club, denies the charges. He admits the banquet and that Judge Grosscup presided, but says the stories which are referred to in the preacher's charges, were given out by disgraced caddies.

Rogers appeared to be in his usual state, not alarming, when he was assisted from the automobile in which he made the trip into the sanatorium. But he soon collapsed. The remains will be sent to Bridgeport, with the permission of the Huntington medical examiner.
