ARIZONA'S BIG GAIN

Washington, Oct. 21.—The population of the territory of Arizona is 247,854, according to statistics of the Thirtieth Census just made public.

Population statistics were also announced for these cities: Charleston, S. C., 58,822, an increase of 3,026 or 5.4 per cent over 55,807 in 1900.

Columbia, S. C., 26,319 an increase of 5,211 or 34.7 per cent over 21,108 in 1900.

FOSS ATTACKS SENATOR LODGE

Boston, Oct. 21.—The name of Congressman Eugene N. Foss will appear twice on the official ballot for Governor in the State election, under the headings "Democratic" and "Democratic Progressive."

In a long statement just issued Congressman Foss referred to a recent utterance by Senator Henry Cabot Lodge deprecating the use of money and force in elections, and said that he was glad to learn that Senator Lodge had "experienced a change of heart."

GRAFT COMMITTEE AT SING SING PRISON TO PROBE CONVICT

(Special from United Press.) New York, Oct. 21.—The Legislative graft committee held a meeting in Sing Sing Prison today. In order that it might be given an opportunity to reply to the charge that it attempted to bribe a legislator, who had been his friend for years, former Quarantine Commissioner Frederick Schroeder was taken from his cell to the office of Warden Sage to tell his story.

It was a most dramatic situation. Nearly every member of the committee had been a close friend of Schroeder while he was a power in the political world. For this man, who faced the probe, had been a prominent business man whose powers as a politician was very great.

Charles R. Mann, Edwin A. Morley, Jr., of the committee, said before the party took the train today for the prison that he had not the slightest idea where the investigation will end.

"We have almost unlimited power," he said, "and we intend to exert it to the limit. If there was a big corruption fund raised to influence legislation, we will try to secure the evidence that will put those who raised

it, and those who administered it, behind the bars where they belong."

A NEW GERMICIDE

May be Taken Internally With Complete Safety

Internal Infection Arrested as Effectually as External Has Been—Further Tests Soon to be Made

To a Minnesota seat of learning, belongs the honor of giving to the world the most wonderful discovery for the physical benefit of mankind that has been known, since medical science discovered the germ theory.

Before giving out the result of his research, Prof. Carel has had exhaustive tests made by several of the leading state and university bacteriologists and their reports have more than borne out his own, he comes before the world of medical science with his discovery, which he has fancifully styled Benetol, (Benetum Napholum) in spite of the desire of many of his friends that he give the chemical his own name.

It is claimed by some of the enthusiastic scientists who have tested Benetol, that it will mean the ending of the terror which has attended typhus, cholera, and all germ diseases. How far it may prove successful it is admitted will depend upon careful tests, but so far actual tests upon people in hospitals in various States have brought reports of even greater success than had been expected by Prof. Carel and his co-workers.

"I dislike discussing the success of my work until it has been proved beyond a doubt by medical science," said Prof. Carel, speaking of the new chemical. "As for my own faith in it, I can only say that I am so confident, that I am willing to submit myself to chlora infection, to prove that it can be successfully treated with my discovery. I firmly believe, that if Benetol has been known, and in use in Russia during this last terrible epidemic, it would have been arrested."

"It may be difficult for the lay mind to realize the great benefits of a powerful germicide, which can be taken internally in plain language it means that internal infection can be arrested just as effectually by its use, as external infection has been in the past by the old agents. As a further illustration in another way, suppose a soldier, parched with thirst after a battle, laps up a pool of stagnant water, in which the deadly typhus germ was present by millions. He might die in a few days, or he might get a germ, and by adding one drop of this new chemical, that water would become harmless, and would instantly change from a germ poison, to a beneficial medicated drink."

It is probable that the medical journals will very shortly be full of discussion regarding the practicability of the use of the new chemical in thousands of different ways. First tests, it is claimed, will probably be made upon animals for new uses. The first result of the discovery however, will be to displace in time, the use of carbolic acid, which is generally used for self destruction. It is even suggested that carbolic acid may be substituted that is harmless, has been found, the sale of carbolic acid may in time be prohibited by law, and the use of lysol and peroxide be practically done away with. Moreover Benetol can be produced so cheaply that it will displace, among the very poor, as well as the rich.

PLATFORM ADOPTED BY DEMOCRATIC CONVENTION

The Democratic party is needed. No party can serve Connecticut effectively in which a nomination is the equivalent of an election. The welfare of the State is assured only when the party in power knows it may lose its influence through the democratic party is in a position to offer it.

The Democratic party of Connecticut, under the leadership of Judge Simeon E. Baldwin, is prepared to defy the agencies of political corruption, to ask why the good of the State and why the special interests should remain the concern of the General Assembly by the exclusion of the needs of the people. This means the return to the faith of the founders.

The Connecticut Democracy favors the repeal of the present law limiting the recovery in death cases to \$5,000 or any other arbitrary sum. The Connecticut Democracy favors the enactment of a workmen's compensation law for injuries.

We believe in the establishment of a civil service law for the State, that the employees of all State institutions may be appointed on the merit system. We call attention to the fact that now for many years the Republican party has used the lower courts of State, city, borough and town courts as part of their political machine for the payment of political debts.

We favor a rational economy in the expenditures of public funds and the abolition of the direct State tax on property. We ask that the recommendations of the Hon. Rollin S. Woodruff that single purchasing department be established for all institutions of the State be adopted.

We favor the ratification of the Income tax amendment to the constitution. We declare for the popular election of United States Senators. The Connecticut Democracy favors the creation of a fifth Congressional district.

The Connecticut Democracy favors the creation of an effective public utilities commission elected by the people, which shall have supervision of all public service corporations. These corporations have not always dealt conscientiously with the State of Connecticut. Because this is the lesson of history, we demand that the terms of the joint partnership shall be so drawn that the public will at all times be assured of protection against the possible greed of the impersonal corporation.
