

DRUDGE SINKS IN BLACK ROCK WITH NINE MEN ABOARD

Government Inspectors and Bridgemen Battle for Life in Raging Storm

Sleepers Hurlled From Their Bunks When Huge Vessel Capsizes Before Force of Wind and Wave and Sinks in 20 Feet of Water—Victims Cling to Rigging for Two Hours in Freezing Gale Before They Are Rescued—Thrilling Experiences of Those on Board

Lashed into tremendous waves by the fiercest northeaster to sweep the New England coast in years, Long Island sound became last night and today a place of dire peril to shipping, and swallowed up, in Black Rock harbor, the fine dredge Capitol City, whose crew and two government inspectors nine in all escaped with their lives after a terrifying experience clinging for two hours to the wind-swept and wave washed rigging.
