Theatrical trunks, built just for strength and convenience. Strong wood with covering of heavy canvas. Binding this canvas are stout slats of hardwood, each one wrapped with iron bands.

Motoring trunks, just right size and proportions to be carried upon one's car. Made of kiln-dried basswood with covering of fine stout black enameled duck.

For hat trunks, special sizes and of correct dimensions for carrying hats without injury, light but of special strength.

Canvas-covered trunks in regular shape, hardwood slats capped with brass, re-enforced by wrought-iron clamps and a binding of hard vulcanized fiber.

Stout trunks with cover of canvas, five strong hardwood slats, wrought iron clamps, binding of vulcanized fiber, excelsior brass lock—28-inch size, \$4; rise of 50 cents in price with added two inches of length.

Suit-cases of black enameled duck over trunk board, wonderfully strong cases and really miniature trunks. Finished with a binding of sole leather and with 2 1/2-inch leather strap encircling them.

Leather suit-cases, steel frame and cloth lining, leather straps handles and special protective corners—\$3 to \$5. Cane-covered suit-cases, especially light and very durable, 24-inch.—\$2.50 to \$6.

Suit-cases covered with matting, particularly good for women to carry because of their lightness, 14 to 26 inches.—\$1.25 to \$3. Club bags of steel frame with covering of fiber matting, deep cut, have brass bolts and sliding brass lock, 14 to 18 inches.—\$1 to \$1.25.
