The nation is to be saved through the regeneration of the individual by the gospel. Three-fourths of the people are not members of the Church. All Colonial immigrants were Protestant. They came to enjoy freedom of conscience. Today immigrants come to make a living and that is all.

The people of foreign parentage, when we have said the worst, are no graver menace to the integrity of our free institutions than the degenerate native stock. There is no more imperative need before the Church than this, to get close to the people outside and know them.

Two veniremen had been accepted by the defense, subject to peremptory challenge and it is expected that at least one more will be secured today.

President Taft Starts East on Return Journey

Half a hundred special policemen and secret servicemen watched over the President during his visit in Los Angeles, the scene of the most serious labor situation on the Pacific coast, where feeling for months has been running high on account of the McNamara case.

PURLOINED ROOSTER SUBJECT OF SUIT

Judge Peck Will Be Called Upon to Tell Who Owns Bird Now Shut Up Gansborough Kitchen

Stratford, Oct. 17—An internecine war on the Canaan road forced its way into the town court this morning, when Annie Gansborough was arraigned on charges of robbing the theft of a chicken, breach of peace and abusive language. The complainant is Mary Dolja who owns the house on the corner of the road, her Plymouth Rock chicken and annexed it in her kitchen contrary to the laws and statutes. Mary also claims that when she attempted to recue her property she was met by abuse and a strenuous defense which she was unable to overcome.
