"Arouse, Ye Slaves."

There are three types of voters. Those who are unscrupulous sharers in the treasons, stratagems and spoils upon which they batten and fatten.

Those who are weak and indifferent; with a sangfroid which would be laughable were it purling foolishness not so pitiful; and

Those who are mentally lazy—who will not take the trouble to investigate what should be, by all rights of human decency and justice, a matter of paramount importance to them as integral parts of the body social.

The grafting thug and boodler is honest—to himself—and single in his motive in extracting all the blood an already emaciated public can spare—and then a little more.

His actions are contemptible, but at least they ARE ACTIONS and shows intelligent interest. It is the difference between an alert bank burglar, and a stupid cretin—a sleek beast of prey, and an unthinking, unreasoning mass of pathologically organized flesh.

The first class deserves consideration from the fact that they are avowed enemies. They fight in the open, and their tiger stripes and bull-pup dispositions are plainly visible without the aid of a telescope. They are true carnivori, and the Ring depends upon their feline services to the last illegal vote cast, and the final dishonest action accomplished.

Those who are arrayed on the side of civic decency and honor know them for what they are. There is no element of the lamb parading around in a tiger's skin in their make-up. They are true specimens—veritable bulwarks of unrighteousness.

It is to the other two classes that we would address ourselves, in a state of nature, is philosophically untenable. The man, possessed of suffrage power, who neglects to affiliate himself with Principle is, first and foremost, an enemy to society, and secondly—from even the most selfish and mercenary standpoint, an enemy to himself—to his own financial and civic well-being. He exemplifies in his laissez faire, the spirit of Inertia.

With smug self-assurance that "All's well" he neglects the most important duty that a man can perform—to attempt, in so far as lies in his power to better conditions of living, and help purify the political atmosphere of his city. It is to this class of voters that the wage slave raises his manacled hands in entreaty for succor from galling oppression; it is to them that the down-trodden serf of a political feudalism directs his prayer for relief from extortion; it is to them that the little slum children, in their helpless ignorance, mutely appeal for the "White child's chance."

Now, the most magnificent word in the English language is "BEAUTY." It symbolizes in this case, noblesse oblige—the knightly obligation the subconscious pledge to a service in the interest of the human family by the very reason of one's ability to render such service.

The Knight, sans peur et sans reproche—who with high purpose and chivalrous soul, went forth on his pilgrimage in pursuit of the Grail, accomplished his real mission—not in finding the Blessed Cup and bringing it safely back—but in the wrongs he righted, the innocents he defended, the outraged he avenged during his pilgrimage. This is the real significance—the beautiful motive for which the Holy Grail stands as a symbol.

Just so with the recalcitrant voter, in the year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and eleven.

There are as many faire ladies, with streaming eyes and heaving bosoms, locked in oppressive castles; there are as many dragons, and Minotours, and giants to-day as there ever were, and more. They simply transmigrated into the bloated carcasses of our "captains of industry"—those gentle souls who are the Yegs of our civilization—who cause three buckets of water to flow where none "few" before—and which, by hocus-pocus they call "high finance," is transformed into an aurate stream, ever purling—like Tennyson's "Babbling Brook"—only more so. As gold-getters they have Jason tied securely to the mast of his Argus and the compass thrown overboard. The monsters of old are reincarnated in the political chieftains, "who toll not, neither do they spin," but who force New York to pay tribute infinitely greater than that from which Perseus released the persecuted ancients.
