

SPENCER FOUND GUILTY OF MURDER IN FIRST DEGREE THIS MORNING

Jekyl and Hyde Robber, Who Shot to Death Miss Martha Blackstone, at Springfield, Remains An Actor When Jury's Verdict is Announced

Convicted Man Disappoints Court Spectators, Who Stayed Till Early Today, Expecting An Outbreak, By Not Making the Slightest Demonstration But Appearing Rather Dazed.

Springfield, Mass., Nov. 25.—At 2:10 o'clock, this morning, after having been out five hours, the jury returned a verdict of guilty of murder in the first degree against Bertram G. Spencer, the Hyde-Jekyl robber who shot to death Miss Martha B. Blackstone at the Dow home on the night of March 31, 1910.

Score Blank At End Of Yale-Harvard Game

Yale Wins Toss and Makes Choice of East Goal, Kicking Off in Presence of 40,000 Spectators in Great Stadium.

In Second Period Philbin Makes Beautiful 42 Yard Run to Harvard's 48 Yard Line.—Bomeisler's Left Shoulder Hurt and Great Left End Is Carried from the Field—Sheldon Takes His Place.

(Special from United Press.) Stadium, Soldiers Field, Boston, Nov. 25.—On a gridiron lightning fast, the Yale bulldog met Johnny Harvard in the 32d annual football clash, today.

Beneath a cloudless sky and with a temperature that set the nerves of spectators and players on edge, the teams met in what was expected to be one of the fiercest fought gridiron battles of the year. Forty thousand people crowded into the monster stadium. Despite the rain of yesterday, the field was in perfect shape.

Not a ticket was to be had from official sources and speculators were demanding \$50 for two seats together. The Yale management had estimated that the largest crowd that ever entered the stadium was expected for today's game.

The Harvard squad appeared on the field at 1:51, followed by the blue and both teams went through preliminary practice in which punting was the feature.

Yale won the toss and chose to defend the east goal, letting Harvard kick off. Philbin plays fullback instead of Dunn for Yale.

Smith kicked off for Harvard, sending the ball to Gallauer, who took Paul's place at right tackle for Yale. Gallauer dropped the ball but recovered it on the 30 yard line.

Philbin gained three yards and followed by the Cardinal designate, left tackle, and it was Yale's ball on Harvard's 10 yard line.

Howe punned to Harvard's 40 yard line where the crimson fumble and the Cardinal designate, left tackle, and it was Yale's ball on Harvard's 15 yard line.

Philbin kicked to Howe, who was thrown on his own 54 yard line. Philbin gained five on a mass through center. Philbin failed to gain around left end. Howe kicked to Campbell, who brought the ball back to Harvard's 28 yard line.

ARSON CASE HERE IS RECALLED BY ARREST OF FUGITIVE FROM JUSTICE

Nicholas Kalal, Alias Nicholas Smith, Wanted by Authorities For Serious Offense

James Hadad Served Jail Term — Saved from Severe Punishment by Clemency Plea of Attorney Shapiro — Tried to Shoot Sergeant O'Leary When Caught Red-Handed — Man Now Under Arrest Believed to Be Real Instigator of a Fair.

After having been a fugitive from this city for eighteen months, Nicholas Kalal, alias Nicholas Smith, is under arrest in Nashville, Tenn., for the crime of arson, the same offense for which the local authorities have long been eager to lay their hands upon him.

Acting under the influence of the older man, young Hadad, who is not over bright, entered the store kept by Kalal and his partner Sevan Selby at 2030 Main street. The youth, who was armed with two huge pistols and a hunting knife, sprinkled gasoline about the store and prepared to set the place on fire in accordance with the instructions of the other, who planned to collect the insurance.
