ASTOR BABY HAS GUARDIAN
E. L. WINTHROP APPOINTED

New York, Aug. 31.—Egerton L. Winthrop, Jr., President of the Board of Education and member of the law firm of Winthrop & Stimson, was appointed special guardian of the baby of John Jacob Astor 6th yesterday by Surrogate Fowler. It will be Mr. Winthrop's duty to represent the new Astor heir in all legal matters until the time of his majority. His first actual work as guardian will be on Sept. 3, when the will of John Jacob Astor will be presented for probate before the Surrogate. Mr. Winthrop will appear on that occasion and state that his ward will not contest the will of his father nor prevent its admission. Dr. Edward B. Craig, Mrs. Astor's physician, submitted an affidavit yesterday in the Surrogate's Court testifying that he had served the extra citation of the coming probate of the Astor will upon the baby on Aug. 28 and had at the same time served a copy of the papers upon Mrs. Madeleine Force Astor. The extra citation, which was physically served upon the infant, in accordance with the law, consisted of a formal notice to appear in court before Surrogate Fowler on Sept. 3 and show cause why the will of John Jacob Astor, deceased, should not be admitted.

MUST PAY WIVES.

Even When Forsaking Wives in Another Country, Court Holds.

New York, Aug. 31.—Charity social workers are rejoicing over a final settlement by the Appellate Division of the vexed question as to whether or not a man who deserts his wife in another country or another State can be held accountable here in New York. Magistrate Harris said that he could. Judge Rosal agreed with him and so did the Appellate Division.

The decision was reached in the case of Benjamin Wexler, who left his wife, Deborah, four weeks after their marriage in Russia and forgot all about her when he became a prosperous furrier in this city. She journeyed across the Atlantic, but he refused to have anything to do with her, or contribute to her support. Then the National Deserter Bureau stood behind her, and finding that moral suasion failed, had Wexler arrested. He pointed out that the desertion occurred in Russia, but the old plea did not serve and now Wexler has fled a bond to secure the alimony order.

Charity workers believe that this decision will prevent many deserted families from becoming charges on public and semi-public organizations.

Trenton, N. J., Aug. 31.—William L. Waldron, State superintendent of weights and measures, has confiscated two five-gallon gasoline cans which were seized in Bayonne and Jersey City for being short two gallons each.

Each was found to have another can built inside, but the work was so cleverly done that the exterior had to be cut before the trick could be solved. The department will now investigate all garages, the superintendent believing that many dealers are using similar cans, and also gasoline pumps so arranged as to give short measure.
