While royalty and officialdom of the nations of the world were weeping over the heroism of the south pole explorers, two suffragettes, wearing broad yellow ribbons with "Votes For Women" on them, attempted to force their way through the north door. Scotland Yard detectives grabbed them and practically threw them into the street.

ALLING'S PITTSFIELD MANAGER SUGGUMBS

Harry L. Hoag, 35, manager of the Alling rubber company's store at Pittsfield, died Wednesday afternoon of pneumonia at a private sanitarium in Hartford, after an illness of three weeks. Congestion of the brain and laryngitis were tributary causes of death. Mr. Hoag was born in Danbury, and after six-months employment in the Hartford store of the Alling company he was transferred to Pittsfield as manager six years ago. He married Miss Helen Davis of Connecticut, who survives as do three children, Doris, Edgar and Marjorie. He also leaves his father, Edward Hoag of Monson. The funeral services were this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock at Danbury.
