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CATHOLIC NEWS IN HARTFORD DIOCESE

The following clerical appointments by Rt. Rev. John J. Nilan, bishop of Hartford, are announced in the "Catholic Transcript" of this week: Rev. Joseph N. Sando to St. Ladislau's South Norwalk. (Administrator.) Rev. John A. Conlon, from St. Rose's, Meriden, to Sacred Heart of East Port Chester. (Administrator pro tem.) Rev. Patrick Dolan, from St. Rose's, Newtown, to St. Rose's, Meriden, (Assistant.) Rev. Philip Coholan to St. Rose's, Newtown, (Assistant.) Rev. Felix Scogliolo to St. Anthony's, Hartford, (Assistant.)

A triduum in honor of the Blessed Eucharist will be held in all the churches of this diocese on Friday, Saturday and Sunday, June 12, 13, 14. This Eucharistic Triduum is prescribed by the Sovereign Pontiff with the object of fostering greater devotion to our Divine Lord in the Holy Eucharist and promoting the practice of daily communion. The prescribed exercises for these days include a sermon on Holy Communion, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament and the recitation of the enclosed prayer.

A partial indulgence of seven years and seven quarantines is granted on the day of the triduum, a plenary indulgence on any day of the triduum to those who go to confession and communion, and also a plenary indulgence to those who go in a body to communion at mass on Sunday. By means of a wireless telephone invented by two French naval officers, conversations were carried on between Paris and Metzray a distance of 150 miles. The first American to receive a pension since the beginning of the Mexican conflict was Mrs. Jennie Smith, of Philadelphia, whose son was killed on April 27 by Mexican snipers. She received the monthly instalment of \$12.

United States Senator Overman of North Carolina was renominated.

Wesley C. Bates, an attorney of Columbus, Ohio, was found guilty of criminal libel by Probate Judge Black in charges published in the Socialist newspaper following the judge's action in firing him for contempt. About 7,250 persons employed at the Westinghouse plants in Pittsburgh have gone on strike for recognition of the union and discontinuance of the bonds and piece systems. A Detroit man paid a Federal income tax of one cent. His income for 10 months was \$2,500.61, of which \$2,500 was exempt. A deputy figured that it cost about \$1.50 to collect the tax. Governor Glynn declined the invitation of women suffragists to speak at their meeting in Albany.
