

STATE OF CONNECTICUT TREASURY DEPARTMENT TAXES ON INVESTMENTS

All persons owning bonds or notes liable to taxation should write at once to State Treasurer, Hartford, Conn., for lists. A circular letter will be sent when requested, explaining the proper way to pay this tax. A law will be introduced in the next General Assembly, and will be urged for passage, taxing estates at the local rates for all the time owned by decedents on such choses in action as have not paid during the life of the owner. This is in the nature of a penalty. Savings Bank deposits are not liable to tax in the owner's name. Money in bank (not a Savings bank) can pay the four mill tax as shown in the circular letter. This tax must be paid before the last of August in Bridgeport. Enquire of your banker or write to the Treasurer at Hartford. EDWARD S. ROBERTS, Treasurer. L 2 a5*
