(Continued from Page 1.) to the Exchange Telegraph Co. from Brussels says that a division of German cavalry which had succeeded in fording the Meuse to the north of Liege, was surprised and practically annihilated by Belgian cavalry and infantry supported by a battery of light artillery.

BRUSSELS, AUG. 8.—The minister of war has received word that fighting has occurred between French and Germans in Belgium and Luxembourg.

PARIS, AUG. 8.—It is officially announced today that English troops under the direction of French officers are disembarking on French soil.

FRANCE AND BELGIUM SWAP COMPLIMENTS AS THEY PRESS ON TO WAR

Brussels, Aug. 8.—King Albert appealed to France for aid in repulsing the German advance, according to the Exchange Telegraph company. The King in a message to President Poincare thanked him for promptness in responding to the Belgian appeal.

RUSSIA PUTS BLAME FOR WAR UPON GERMANY

St. Petersburg, Aug. 8.—The government has published the official dispatch in connection with the negotiations between Russia and Germany preceding the war. It is stated that they show Russia's pacific intentions to the last and fix complete responsibility for the war on Germany.

GERMANY HOLDS OFF ON ORDER FOR MORATORIUM

Berlin, Aug. 8.—The German federal cabinet today refused to proclaim a moratorium for the present. The courts were empowered to deal leniently with debtors and the term for the payment of debts will be extended for three months. In certain cases relief was granted for bill of exchange transactions.

MAY SUSPEND PAPER MONEY.

Rio de Janeiro, Aug. 8.—The Brazilian cabinet met in council today under the presidency of President Hermes de Fonseca and decided to ask Congress to consent to the omission of paper money in Brazil.

BRITISH CRUISER COALS FOR CANADIAN PORT

San Francisco, Aug. 8.—The British cruiser Raleigh sailed today. The authorities had permitted the vessel to take aboard 50 tons of coal, sufficient to take it to the nearest port, Victoria, B. C.

WAR RISK RATE CUT

London, Aug. 8.—The war risks insurance office today reduced its rates on cargo from 1-4 to 1-5 per cent.

AMERICANS LEFT STRANDED.

Glasgow, Aug. 8.—Today's sailings of the steamships of the Anchor, Algonquin and Donaldson lines were cancelled and consequently about 1,000 Americans and Canadians who had booked their passages are left stranded here.

DROWNS IN RIVER WHILE TRYING TO SPEAR FISH

East Canada, Conn., Aug. 8.—While attempting to spear a fish in the Blackberry river in which he was fishing last night, Louis Bianchi, aged 42, fell in and was drowned before his four companions could aid him. His wife and five children survive.

GERMANY TO WAGE WAR "EVEN AGAINST DEVILS."

Berlin, Aug. 8.—Prince Buelow, former German imperial chancellor in a patriotic appeal to the German nation made in the columns of the Hamburger Nachrichten today, concludes with the striking phrase: "Even if the world be filled with devils, the German people will defend and maintain its place in the sun."

HERE, SHE SIGHTED A BRITISH CRUISER AND FORTHWITH RUN UP A BRITISH FLAG.

Amsterdam, Aug. 8.—The Telegraph reports the receipt of a wireless message announcing that a German cruiser is enroute for Ymuiden, bringing ten men who were wounded in a naval battle.

ST. PETERSBURG, AUG. 8.—Austrian troops crossed the Russian frontier near the Rumanian border today and burned some villages.

NEW YORK, AUG. 8.—Cardinal Farley and his party, as to whose safety abroad there had been some anxiety, are safe at Brunnen, Switzerland.

AMERICAN WOMAN KILLS HERSELF AS RESULT OF TRIALS

London, Aug. 8.—Mrs. James T. Mackay, of Denver, Colo., committed suicide today as a result of a nervous breakdown caused by the privation she had undergone since she was ordered out of her sick bed at Antwerp on Monday. She arrived in London yesterday and her mother and child in Germany.

FRANCE DECORATES LIEGE FOR ITS BRAVE DEFENSE AGAINST INVASION

Brussels, Aug. 8.—The war office has issued an official statement saying that the 125,000 Germans participating in the assault on Liege failed to make any impression on the fortified city. Three army corps engaged in the attack were cut up and rendered useless, it is declared.

RESERVE LADEN SHIPS HELD UP IN NEW YORK HARBOR

New York, Aug. 8.—The White Star liner Olympic, to have cleared from this port today, is indefinitely under receipt of orders from the British admiralty. The sailing of the Red Star liner Vanderland, on which 1,000 Belgian reservists were booked for a British port, also was delayed.

U. S. A. CITIZENS GIVEN EVERY AID BY FRENCH

Paris, Aug. 8.—The French military authorities are offering every facility for American citizens in France. The French war office was considered, even to Germany today, were placed three omnibuses temporarily at the service of the American embassy for the transportation of homeless Germans from the embassy offices to the school buildings, where they are now lodged.

DISCOUNT RATE REDUCED.

London, Aug. 8.—The Bank of England discount rate was reduced today from 6 to 5 per cent.

HARTFORD, AUG. 8.—The Seth Thomas Clock company of Thomaston today filed in the office of the state secretary a certificate increasing its capital stock to \$1,000,000.

Nation Will Pay Last Tribute To Wife Of President Monday

Washington, Aug. 8.—The nation, represented by committees from the Senate and House, will pay its final tribute to Mrs. Wilson, wife of the President, in private services in the East Room of the White House, Monday afternoon. Immediately afterward, a special train conveying Mrs. Wilson's body, the President's family, several members of the cabinet and a few friends and relatives, will leave for Rome, Ga., where interment will take place in Myrtle Hill cemetery, Tuesday afternoon.

GERMANS IN U. S. ASKS WHOLE WORLD FOR PLAIN JUSTICE

New York, Aug. 8.—The United German-American Alliance in resolutions made public today calls upon the press of the country to accord impartiality and just treatment to all sides in the European conflict and condemn what is styled as the "attitude of certain portions of an English-speaking American press to spread impressions which lead to hatred of Germany and Germanization."

When a teacher is ill the past term, it was formerly the rule of the Board of Education to pay teachers one-quarter of their pay during four weeks if they were ill. The teachers now receive full pay for the first two weeks they are ill and half pay for the next two weeks.
