Ratification of the city ticket of the Socialist party was made last night at their headquarters, though already in effect through referendum vote. ROSEN FAMILY LOST IN RUSSIA, DOCTOR LAUDS CONGRESSMAN AND OFFICIALS WHO AIDED IN QUEST

Says Donovan, Who Personally Conducted His Search Is Humanitarian Such As Seldom Found

Still anxiously awaiting word from Russia, which will establish the whereabouts of his wife and daughter, Dr. Maurice S. Rosen, the well known eye and ear specialist of 493 Fairfield avenue, to-day paid the highest tribute possible to members of the state department at Washington in general and Congressman Jeremiah Donovan of Connecticut in particular.

While Mrs. and Miss Rosen, who have been in Russia for nearly a year and were caught in the battle tide at Warsaw, were later located by the State Department and consuls, at Riga, through a desire to reach Stockholm in time to take passage on the relief ship at that port, they have again become lost, and every effort on the part of United States officials have failed to locate them.

It was in the hope of sending money abroad in time to aid them at Riga that Dr. Rosen went to Washington and appealed to Congressman Donovan, only upon the receipt of a cablegram in Bridgeport announcing their hurried departure to another city.

The courtesy of the local Congressman is best expressed in the words of Dr. Rosen who said:

"In my naturally upset state of mind over my family words cannot express the broad humanitarianism of Congressman Donovan. When I received a telegram from him that the state department had heard through their consul at Riga from my wife and daughter who were well but requested that I send sufficient funds to enable them to reach the relief ship at Stockholm, I took what little money I had on my person, amounting to but \$300 and hastened to Washington.

"I had never met the Congressman in my life but he greeted me as a

friend. He listened to my story with the utmost interest and though his arm was bandaged in a sling and he looked like a scarred veteran of the present war, he took me from one building to another and pleaded my cause with the various officials. I should estimate that we were compelled to climb twenty different flights of steps, and though I was nearly worn out with the strain, his determination to get results was indomitable.

When it was suggested that I cable funds directly through the state department to St. Petersburg to be given to Mrs. Rosen instead of the bank draft I had already sent, I found that an amount of \$500 or more was necessary to insure her safe passage.

"Though, as I have previously said, I had never met the Congressman nor to my knowledge did he ever see me before, when I communicated to him that I would be handicapped without my check-book and the opening of the banks on the following day, without hesitation he did an act I could never have expected and which I should have hesitated to do.

"Reaching into his own pocket he took out a check-book and writing a personal check of several hundred dollars he immediately had it cashed and placed it at my disposal. It was the finest and most humane act I have ever witnessed between one man and another and the gratitude which must be in the hearts of fathers and mothers, husbands and wives, who must have similarly appealed to him in their distress must ever go out to him for such a generous spirit. I cannot convey to the public or to him my personal appreciation of his kindness other than to let the facts become public."
