"When our sincere and strenuous efforts to prevent a European war failed we would gladly have stood aside had it been possible. We were bound to make the observance of Belgian neutrality one of the conditions of our own neutrality.

Five German Corps to Oppose Russ Advance

Paris, Sept. 5.—Via London.—Five German army corps have arrived at the Vistula river according to the Rome correspondent of the Paris Matin. These corps are mostly from Belgium and the north of France.

Turkey Is Promised Its Integrity If It Keeps Out of War

London, Sept. 5.—A belated message from Constantinople, dated Aug. 31, says the ambassadors to Turkey of the powers of the entente, Great Britain, France and Italy, have agreed in a formal manner the communication made to the Grand Vizier, Aug. 17, guaranteeing the independence and integrity of the Ottoman Empire.

U. S. RELIEF HEAD REPORTS 6,000 IN NEED OF MONEY

London, Sept. 5.—Herbert C. Hoover, chairman of the American relief committee in London, reports today that his committee has just finished the most strenuous week it has had since the war began.

A majority of those remaining require assistance. The committee estimates that, during the past week, a total of 6,000 Americans have crossed the Channel into England and that 600 of these were absolutely destitute. Most of them had to be fed at the committee's stations.

New York, Sept. 5.—A party of 18 young women of Wellesley college, two teachers and 14 students, married in Italy at the beginning of the European war and unable to get steamship accommodations home, reached New York today aboard the Italian tank steamship Lampo from Genoa.

HEADQUARTERS OF GRAND MARSHAL LABOR DAY DEMONSTRATION.

Bridgeport, Conn., Sept. 2nd, 1914.

General Orders NO. 3.

The following orders for the organization, movement and dismissal of the parade are published for the guidance of all concerned.

Formation. 1. The Grand Marshal will establish headquarters at East Main St., and Stratford avenue at 10:15 a. m.

2. The parade will be divided into five divisions as follows: First Division—Charles Stout, Chief of Division. Second Division—William Larkin, Chief of Division. Third Division—Martha L. Kane, Chief of Division. Fourth Division—Alfred J. McKeon, Chief of Division. Fifth Division—John J. O'Neil, Chief of Division.

3. The First Division will form on East Main street, south of Stratford avenue, with right resting on Stratford avenue.

The Second Division will form on App street, with right resting on East Main street.

The Third Division will form on Nichols street, east of East Main street, with right resting on East Main street.

The Fourth Division will form on Nichols street, west of East Main street, with right resting on East Main street.

The Fifth Division will form on Cedar street, with right resting on East Main street.

The 1st, 2nd, 3rd and 5th Divisions will enter to their places of formation from Stratford avenue, via Park street.

The 4th Division will enter from Stratford avenue via Kossuth street.

4. Each organization commander will report to the Chief of his division as soon as the organization is in position.

5. Chiefs of Divisions will report organizations in their divisions have reported.

6. Organizations are to be in position in their respective divisions not later than 10:30 a. m.

Line of March. 7. The parade column will start promptly at 11 o'clock a. m. from Stratford avenue and East Main street and move north on East Main street to East Washington avenue, to Main street, to Fairfield avenue, to Park avenue, to Park Place, counter-march to State street, (passing in review at City Hall) to John street and dismiss.

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8. Bands will march in quick time, the length of the step thirty inches and the cadence 120 steps per minute.

9. The success of the parade and its prompt movement past the reviewing officer depends upon "Chiefs of Divisions who will be required to have the column kept closed and in line."

10. The Grand Marshal will review the parade at Main and Bank streets, and after passing the Grand Marshal the several divisions will be dismissed as follows: 1st Div.—John St., west to Courtland street, counter-march to Main street and dismiss. 2nd Div.—Cannon St., west to Courtland street, counter-march to Main street and dismiss. 3rd Div.—West on Fairfield avenue, 4th Div.—Eim street west to Harrison street at Park avenue, west to Main street and dismiss. 5th Div.—Main street, north to Madison avenue to Eagle hall.

11. Chiefs of Divisions will instruct their aides to assist organizations in complying with paragraph 10, by giving proper direction to their division units upon dismissal. Commanders will make every effort to keep their respective organizations closed up and moving until they have reached the dismissing point, and avoid, by halting, all danger of blocking the parade column.

12. Color bearers and bands will report to the Grand Marshal at Cannon St. later than 8:30 a. m.

13. Assembly will be sounded at 2:45 p. m., and the column will move north on Broad street to Fairfield avenue, to Main street to Esplanade Park, to Park street, to Park Place, to Main street and bands will be assembled south of and facing the band stand.

14. Organization commanders will detail two members to act as color guard with the colors of their respective organizations.

15. Leader Paul G. Goulding of the Coast Artillery Corps Band is hereby authorized to direct the color guard and to lead the band during the exercise at the Park.
