Gave Three Sons to France

Paris, April 24—Three of the four sons of Charles Legrand who entered the army have been killed in action.

Whole Cabinet Teetotal

London, April 24—The Daily Chronicle says: "An Opposition newspaper is publishing a list of Cabinet Ministers, who, it is alleged, have not followed the King's example in giving up the use of wine and other alcoholic beverages."

Duchess Accuses Germans

Luxemburg, April 24—Grand Duchess Marie of Luxemburg has sent an official protest to Berlin against the methods of distribution of food supplies, which she says have resulted in bringing nearly half of her subjects to the verge of starvation.

Must Not Sell German Maps

Berlin, April 24—An order has been issued by the military Governor of the province of Brandenburg forbidding the sale of detail maps and guide books of other countries describing the northern, eastern or western boundary districts of Germany.

No Foreign Claims Until July 31

Berlin, via London, April 24—The Federal Council has extended until July 31 the operation of the order which provides that claims held by foreign persons or corporations which accrued before July 31, 1914, cannot be subject to German courts.

REMNANT OF CREW OF EMDEN IN PORT AFTER DARING TRIP

Berlin, April 24.—According to a report reaching here today, the sailing vessel Aysha, manned by the remainder of the crew of the German cruiser Emden, sunk by the Australian cruiser Sydney last November, succeeded in reaching the Arabian port of Lidd, from Hodeidah.

The bold exploit of this remnant of the Emden's crew has constituted one of the most dramatic episodes of the war. The men were members of the landing party which was on Cocos Island when the battle occurred between the Australian cruiser Sydney and the Emden in which the German cruiser was sunk.

SENATOR WEEKS SOLICITOUS FOR BIG RAILROADS

San Francisco, April 24.—The less the government has to do with business the better it will be for business and the people, said United States Senator John W. Weeks, of Massachusetts, in an address before the Commercial Club here last night.

If the policy of the interstate commerce commission towards the railroads is not modified, he asserted, most of the railroads will be driven into bankruptcy.

"Punish the individual who violates the law but do not punish at the same time the entire trade with which he is connected, its business, employees and community which it serves," said Senator Weeks.

"Remove all unnecessary handicaps from business, give it real freedom; make efficiency rather than government, monopoly and restriction its dominating influence."

"Such intelligent action will mean a new era, a better era. By following this course we will insure the retention of our jobs, our industry and our opportunity to invade other markets."

THAW'S VICTORY IS DISPUTED BY STATE'S COUNSEL

New York, April 24—Harry K. Thaw, who went to sleep in the Tombs prison last night elated by his belief that he had won his long fight for a jury trial to test his sanity, awoke today to learn that he must await the decision of the appellate division of the supreme court before such a hearing would be granted.

This new check in his attempt legally to obtain his freedom from the Matteawan Asylum to which Justice Farge had ordered him returned, was due to the announcement by Attorney-General Woodbury that the state would ask the appellate division for a writ of prohibition against the order for a jury trial granted yesterday by Justice Hendrick.

Attorney-General Woodbury's decision was made public after Thaw had retired for the night. The attorney-general contends that Justice Hendrick does not possess the power to grant a jury trial on a writ of habeas corpus obtained by Thaw.

Sailors of Italian Ships Can't Tell Destination

Paris, April 24—Members of the crews of the ships in the Italian fleet now assembled at Taranto have been forbidden to mention their present location where they are going in letters they write home, according to dispatches received by Swiss newspapers.

Aeroplanes of Allies Active Over Smyrna

Paris, April 24—The allies aeroplanes are showing activity over Smyrna, say dispatches from Saloniki. A French aviator recently dropped two bombs on Kastrio, killing several soldiers; others sank a German ship lying in port, and a third struck the railroad station.

Observations made by aviators, according to the despatch, indicate that the Turkish forces assigned for the defense of Smyrna number 35,000. They occupy trenches extending from Voelraht to Smyrna and are posted on heights commanding the city.
