Summary OF THE War News

Heavy fighting has occurred on the Isonzo front, north of the gulf of Trieste. A despatch from Innsbruck, Austria, says the Austrian casualties in the victory of Gorz and Gradisca have amounted to 1,500, with nearly as large a total for the Italians.

Although the German war office claims to have recaptured some of the lost positions in the north Aras, no mention of reverse is made in today's communication from the French office. It is said there have been no new developments of importance.

Premier Asquith today moved in the House of Commons a vote of credit of \$1,250,000,000 and estimated the expenditure of the next three months at not less than \$15,000,000 daily.

The losses of men in the British navy up to May 31 are given officially in London today as 13,847, of which 3,245 were killed.

Although recent press despatches have stated the Italians who crossed the lower Isonzo were pushing forward toward Trieste, skirting the head of the gulf of Trieste, an official announcement from Rome to-day gives no indication of a further advance in this direction.

Elsewhere along the front small Italian victories are claimed. The Italian war office charges Austria with the encouragement of brigandage in the territory occupied by Italy.

The extent of the new Austro-German victory in Galicia is in doubt. Although Berlin and Vienna assert the whole Russian line over a 43 mile front north and east of Przemyel was broken down, it is said officially at Petrograd that the Russians recaptured on Sunday almost all the advanced trenches north of Przemyel lost on Saturday.

An announcement of the Turkish war office claims a victory over the Russians in the transcaucasus. The Turks, it is said, occupied points in the direction of Olti, near the Russian border.

Official VIEWS OF World's War ITALIAN
Rome, June 15.—The following statement regarding the progress of military operations was issued tonight at the headquarters of the Italian general staff: "There have been no important developments along the Tyro-Trentino frontier. The enemy persistently attacked Montepiano after an all-day bombardment from Forts Plats and Wicz but was repulsed each time.

TURKISH
Constantinople, June 15.—An official statement issued tonight at the Turkish war office was as follows: "On May 24 an aviator who went up from an English cruiser near Endian (Persia) was shot down."

FRENCH
Paris, June 15.—The French war office this afternoon gave out a statement on the progress of hostilities which reads as follows: "There is nothing of importance to add to the announcement given out last night. An attack by the enemy against the trenches occupied by us June 4 at Quinnevere was repulsed.

READY TO ASSIST IN PEACE MOVES, PRESIDENT SAYS
Washington, June 15.—Reports that the United States had declined to become a party to efforts in various countries to make peace in Europe were said by President Wilson to be untrue. He declared the Washington government has done everything that could be legitimately done to encourage any movement that might lead to peace or an accommodation of interests in Europe.
