ANOTHER GREAT SLIDE EXPECTED AT "BIG DITCH"

More Than Two Thousand Feet of Bank Threatens To Fall Into Canal.

Panama, June 28.—Although the condition of the channel through the Culebra Cut section of the Panama Canal now is excellent and sufficiently deep and wide to pass the largest dreadnaughts in the United States navy, fears are expressed that soon practically the entire west bank of the canal from Contractors' Hill to the old Administration Building in the village of Culebra will slide into the canal.

Although survey of the entire section has just been completed and it has been discovered that high up on the hillside many ominous fissures have opened which indicate that practically the entire section will ultimately have to be removed from the channel by the dredges. The section extends for approximately 2,500 feet parallel to the canal and for about 1,500 feet back from the canal axis.

PRESIDENT GIVES GOLF COURSE AT CORNISH A PLAY

Cornish, N. H., June 28.—President Wilson settled down today to the enjoyment of his first vacation of the summer. He was up early and after breakfast took a motor ride of 20 miles for a game of golf on the links of the Hanover club. The road wound between towering hills, where the cool, bracing air put him in good condition for his game.

The President planned to devote most of the afternoon in attending to official business which has accumulated at the "Summer White House." Petition made to Secretary Lansing by New York importers last week for the assistance of the American government in getting goods out of Rotterdam and other neutral ports abroad, will be considered by the President in the preparation of the note to Great Britain which will be sent to London soon after his return to Washington.

THROUGH AT MASS AS BOLT STRIKES CHURCH STEEPLE

Williamstown, June 28.—While several hundred people were attending mass in St. Joseph's church yesterday, lightning struck the steeple, doing considerable damage and frightening the congregation. When the damage was outside, apparently lightning struck on the north side of the steeple above the bell loft. A great piece of granite was broken off and smashed to pieces. Another big piece of granite was partially dislodged and fell from the top of the steeple. Considerable slate was broken. On the south side of the steeple there are two places where slate was broken. In the bell loft were about fifty pigeons and they were all killed.

URGERS GERMANS TO EAT MORE MUSHROOMS.

Hamburg, June 28.—As an auxiliary food of which little advantage is taken, mushrooms are being urged upon German epicures, and especially upon Catholics as substitutes for meat on fast days. Dr. von Langemann, a Dresden physician, estimates that there are over 200 kinds of mushrooms in Germany. At least one-quarter of these are not only edible but nourishing and tasty, while only seven can be classed as poisonous toadstools.

GOLD "BREAD CARDS" NOW

Berlin, June 28.—The very latest thing in watch charms is a miniature "bread card" of gold or silver which is being manufactured in Austria for the benefit of charity. The "cards" bear on one side the red and yellow cross and the words "75 grams bread or 50 gram flour." On the other is the inscription "Souvenir of the world-war, 1914-15."

Seek Clemency For General De Wet As He Begins Prison Term

A movement has been started in South Africa to obtain clemency for General De Wet, the former famous leader of the Boers. A short time ago General De Wet was found guilty of treason and sentenced to two years' imprisonment and to pay a heavy fine. It was charged that he attempted to join the German army. Now it is said that his health is poor and that he may not live out his term.

OUT OF WORK, HE WOULD END LIFE BY RAT POISON

George W. Ross, aged 67, a life-long resident of Bridgeport, is believed to have attempted suicide this morning by swallowing a quantity of rat poison, containing arsenic. He is in Bridgeport hospital under observation after having the contents of his stomach removed by a stomach pump. A telephone call from 22 Clarence street this morning took the ambulance to that address in quick order. The hysterical lodging house-keeper told the surgeon that Ross had swallowed a quantity of the poison while suffering from depression due to lack of work. Ross was found in an upstairs room, ill, but denying that he had taken the poison. After treatment he was removed to Bridgeport hospital that his condition might be watched.

ALASKA RAILROAD BUILDERS REPLY TO LABOR CRITICS

Seward, Alaska, June 28.—Replying to criticisms said to have been made by the unemployed here and at Ship Creek regarding the methods of the Alaska Engineering Commission in its work of constructing the government railroad from Seward to Fairbanks, William C. Edes, chairman of the commission in a statement given out today says: "We have been criticised for employing what is referred to as foreign labor and for cutting the so-called Alaska wage scale. The men gathered here to secure station work are above the average. Many come here from the railroads just completed in Canada and we are fortunate to get such experienced help. "The commission is handicapped by the federal eight-hour law because the season is only seven or eight months long and the men would prefer working longer hours for more pay. The wages paid are 27 1/2 cents an hour, which after deducting a dollar a day for board, leaves two dollars. With 24 hours daylight, the men could work 10 hours with ease. With this in mind, the commission is letting out contracts to groups of men and contractors that they may work as long as they wish."

WAITER AND LAWYER HELD IN PLOT TO KILL WEALTHY MAN

Pittsburgh, June 28.—George McHenry, a waiter of Washington, D. C., who was arrested there and brought here last night in connection with an attempt on the life of Franklin T. Schneider, a wealthy candy manufacturer, in a hotel here last Thursday was identified today by G. W. Morris, manager of the hotel, as having been a guest there the day Schneider was assaulted. McHenry and Thomas G. Forney, the Washington attorney who is alleged by the police to have confessed that he was implicated in the plot to kill Schneider, his father-in-law, will be given a hearing June 30 on charges of felonious assault and battery with attempt to kill.
