## JENNINGS REPORTS RECORD RAINFALL THROUGH AUGUST

Precipitation Nearly Four Inches Registered on August 4.

August was a deceptive month, according to the weather reports submitted to the U. S. Weather Bureau by meteorological observer, William Jennings. While Bridgeport saw 13 fully clear days, 11 partly cloudy and seven entirely overcast, yet the precipitation of rainfall was 6.57, with 3.75 inches August 4, which daily record was exceeded in 20 years only by the record of one day in August, 1908, 3.94 inches.

The greatest precipitation was shown August 1 to 4 and with the great precipitation of the last two days of July, it may well be taken to establish a record for rainfall in this section. During the month 6.57 inches of rain fell.

In other ways the month of August was a delightful one here for summer vacationists as the maximum temperature was only 90 degrees with a minimum of 50 and an average temperature throughout of 70.5. The greatest rise or fall of the mercury in any day was shown on August 29 when it varied 30 degrees. The last daily range was 8 degrees on both August 2 and 29.

There were several thunderstorms recorded during the month, notably August 1, 8, 9, 22 and 25. Southwest winds prevailed, though during the excessive rains, high westerly winds blew at an estimated velocity of 40 miles an hour.

## BRIDGEPORT WILL HAVE KILTIES' BAND IN THE EARLY FALL

Organizer of Waterbury Band Has 60 Interested In Movement.

Bridgeport soon will have a Kilties' band. Members of Clam Campbell, O. S. C. are behind the project and some 60 members of that clan have already signed the roll of a social organization which is to support the band. Arrangements are being made to hire the rehearsal room of the Bridgeport Musical Union for one rehearsal each week. John Thompson, organizer and director of the Scotch Pipe band in Waterbury, an organization now famous all over New England, will organize and direct the band here. The first meeting and rehearsal will probably be held next Monday.

It is planned to have at least 20 musicians besides the drum major. The latter will be the tallest man in Clam Campbell who can be found willing to take the position. The members of the band will be required to buy their own instruments but the uniforms will be the property of the band so that if any member is unable to play an engagement a substitute may play for him and wear his uniform. The uniforms will be the regulation Highland costume with kilts.

The band instruments will consist of the Scottish pipes, fife, bass and snare drums. Director Thompson believes the band will be ready to accept engagements this fall.

## GERMAN ARMIES IN RUSSIA PROFIT BY EXPERIENCE OF NAPOLEON, SAYS COMMANDER

Budapest, Hungary, Sept. 3.—General von der Marwitz, the German commander of the Tenth Army Corps, who is undergoing a cure at Posten, in Hungary, after an arduous campaign in Poland, declares that the Russian "policy of fighting by retreat," while in some ways very effective, must inevitably ruin the morale of the soldiers. Discussing the campaign in Poland, he said: "If the Russians repeat the strategy of 1812 by devastating and burning everything behind them, they can do it without compelling us to repeat any of the mistakes of Napoleon. It is a foolish mistake to assume that the German staff is not thoroughly familiar with the lessons of Napoleon's 1812 campaign. We have studied it thoroughly, and have learned all it has to teach."

"I came from the front a few days ago. I was located to the south of Cholim. There the Russian wheat was mostly untouched, but the villages were burned down and the Russians had taken all the agricultural laborers with them. We immediately formed German agricultural committees to harvest the wheat. In some of the places further toward the interior I learn that the Russians are now burning the wheat also, but this does not bother us."

"As a matter of fact, we shall not really invade Russia proper. We shall reach a certain line, will there reconstruct the defensive works, and remain until peace comes. The tactics of the Russians to retreat when in dangerous positions will not persuade us to follow them into dangerous positions ourselves. We are much too clever for that."

"The continuous retreat is not good military tactics—it is too hard on the morale of the soldiers. In fact, my impression is that, to a great extent, the spirit of the Russian army is

broken already. It will not be of any great importance whether we pursue them or not, for the Russians at present are incapable of any offensive on a large scale. Here and there the Russians still possess intact forces, which can undertake a partial offensive sometimes, but they do not achieve any success of note. Whatever successes they win at isolated points cannot affect the general situation."

"As to all this talk about '1812 tactics', I am perfectly safe in saying that our armies will only continue the pursuit as long as our communications are not threatened and the work of supplying the army goes on unhindered."

#### MONTH OF SEPTEMBER, 1915

FAILURE to do so will compel the Assessors to make out such list from the best information obtainable, to which a penalty of ten per cent. will be added as by the law required. Each parcel of real estate must be described by metes and bounds; by street number or lot number; all buildings thereon must be entered separate from the land.

FAILURE TO FILE A LIST deprives the owner of the right to appeal to the BOARD OF RELIEF.
