According to reports at the meeting, the strikers were told yesterday, when they went after their pay envelopes, to come to work Monday or they will be discharged.

Mrs. Mary Scully rallied them. "I've never lost a strike yet," she said. "I have been down in the mines and I've been in Kalamazoo and I've never been beaten." She said she won't be beaten here.
