Her plans, however, fall through the intervention of John Willis, but before Mary's name has been cleared, disheartened and discouraged, Mary returns to her home on Mosby Island, Chesapeake Bay, where she is quickly followed by John Willis, who establishes her innocence. While making his investigations he makes the great discovery that all women are not alike and much to his surprise, finds himself in love with Mary.

The characters in "What Happened to Mary" are all human. Its genuine heart interest, and its healthiness of motive is unimpaired, more respectable quarters. He offers her a position as stenographer in his office and she accepts.
