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TAX BOARD DOES JUGGLING STUNT WITH CITY FUNDS

Public Works Department Gets Many Transfers—School Funds Also.

That old stand-by "Macadam Repairs," from which the cost of anything from joy rides to aidernanic committee dinners is taken, received an awful hauling and dragging at the special meeting of the board of apportionment in city hall last night.

Director Courtaud explained that the money was to be used: \$300 for painting bridges; \$800 for new culverts in Park; \$250 for the portable reviewing stand; \$3,000 for grading Beers street; \$2,500 for new culverts in Barnum avenue and \$1,479.40 for cleaning and repairing sewers.

Commissioners William P. Kirk and Jarvis S. Williams refused to allow the transfer of any part of the school building fund bonds to pay teachers' salaries. The board of education had asked for the transfer of \$5,000 from the building fund for this purpose.

The board also allowed the transfers of \$1,500 from painting fire escapes and \$2,500 from vacuum cleaners to teachers' salary account.
