
SAID GEORGE BONE CANNOT LIVE LONG

ANNIVERSARIES OF RING BATTLES

1859—William J. (Steamboat) Billy Scott, light heavyweight boxer, born at Collingwood, Ont. "Steamboat Billy" was Jack Johnson's principal sparring partner when the big smoke was preparing for his battle with Jess Willard in Havana. Billy took an awful mauling from Johnson, and the latter seemed to take great delight in punishing the white man, who weighs only 155 pounds. According to Scott he got only \$55 from Johnson for his work. Scott was later matched for a ring bout in Havana with John Lester Johnson, another colored fighter, and was soundly drubbed. Scott began his ring career in 1911, and most of his early fights were staged in Buffalo and vicinity. He went along without a defeat until 1913, when he was knocked out by Knockout Brennan in Buffalo and by Buck Cross in Erie. Scott is nearly six feet 10 inches tall and has a reach of 72 inches.
