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CANADIANS' HORSE HOSPITAL AT FRONT DOES EXCELLENTLY

Ottawa, Canada, Dec. 9.—An interesting official account of how horses fare in war is contained in a report received here from the Chief Remount Officer with the Canadian troops in France. There are approximately 15,000 horses with the Canadian Army Corps in France, and the report points out that even in modern warfare each infantry division of 21,000 men requires 8,200 horses.

The horses of a division are taken care of by twelve veterinary officers and one mobile veterinary section of twenty-seven men, which attends to the horses in the firing line. There is one Canadian field hospital in France composed of three hundred cases, and the work which is done there is really remarkable. Horses, which in previous wars and in civilian life, would be destroyed at once, are treated so successfully that in due course they become fit for military duty in the firing line. It is interesting to note that of six hundred and seven horses sent in on one occasion, only twelve died. Five hundred and seven horses sent in on one occasion, only twelve died. Five hundred and ninety-five eventually became fit for re-issue or to be sold as assets for easy duty.

The men work under the most trying conditions, often exposed to the fire of the enemy. They are up and around the lines, all the time gathering in wounded horses, their horsemanship is remarkable. Wounded horses are immediately given first aid. Any horse that can walk is pushed back to the mobile section, or field hospital, his wounds are carefully treated and every care given him.

During the second battle of Ypres, when the Canadians were pressed to their utmost, at no time was the supply of horses diminished at the firing line. As casualties occurred among baggage and transport horses, reinforcements were pushed through the storm of bursting shells to take their places. Although our guns were within three hundred yards of the enemy, there never was a wagon or a gun lost, in what is known as one of the fiercest engagements that has taken place in this war. Horses' wounds heal more rapidly than a man's. Cases of horses with ten bullets in them have been known to report complete recovery within a very few weeks. If a horse cannot walk, however, he is usually considered a hopeless case, and must be destroyed. These horses and those which are killed outright, are thrown to one side, during an engagement and buried after.

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CIVIC BODIES AND CHURCHES PLAN TO WORK IN UNISON

Churchmen Believe Rural Uplift Necessary to Success of Religious Effort. Columbus, Ohio, Dec. 9.—Big work for rural churches in the United States was mapped out here today by prominent agriculturists and church leaders of more than a score of denominations, attending the national conference of the Commission on Church and Country Life which opened yesterday and will conclude tomorrow evening with an address by President Wilson.

The program adopted today provides that movements shall be instituted in every state within the next year to make rural churches participate in these activities: Good roads, better farming and extension of agricultural colleges, work for public health and sanitation, temperance and law enforcement, consolidation of schools where possible, social and recreational centers, community beautification, restoration of religious and patriotic holidays and boys' and girls' agricultural contests. These activities are to be managed in addition to regular religious work.
