TAXATION GROSSLY UNFAIR THE CLAIM OF SENATOR PECK

(Special to the Farmer.)

Redding, March 2—The Peck and Lutgen appeals made to the board of relief last week are the subject of an explanatory letter to your correspondent from Senator Peck. He writes from New York as follows:

"The facts were brought out that the average tax assessed on Daniel Wood's property was at \$35 per acre. On John J. Reynolds' property which abuts mine on the east side of the road was worth much more than that on the west side. The property I acquired on the west side of the road commonly known as the 'Kelly' property, two-thirds of it unimproved, is assessed at about \$40 per acre which you will observe differs almost by one-third above that which is owned by John J. Reynolds on the east side of the road. My contention has been that the transfer of title has made a magical value. Twenty-five acres more or less purchased from Henry Osborne at \$450 on the east side of the road abutting my property on the north was assessed at \$25 in years past, which was at about the same value as Mr. Wood's. The assessors gradually moved it up until it was incorporated with the rest of Wiantuck

farm at an average of \$100 per acre. This same thing applied to 88 acres that I bought from Mrs. Sarah Mandeville for \$3,000. Previously these parcels had no unusual value beyond surrounding land. Last year the board of relief denied me any reductions on the plea that all of that property they classified as building lots. I have never had an inquiry for such a negotiation. It might be called mining property. The highway in the spring in front of these 'building lots' you are familiar with.

"Mr. Barnett's property evidently is immune from any impositions for future or present development other than farming. He is assessed at about \$30 per acre. His house at \$2,800. As for Mr. Lutgen's woods, Newtown assesses him at \$10 per acre. Mr. Lutgen has written to the town clerk at Bethel for their assessment on his woodland. Neither Mr. Lutgen nor myself are adverse to paying an equitable tax. Even a superficial examination of the tax books reveals a discrimination in land values against him and myself. Mr. Spottwood D. Bowers, who has had considerable experience in such matters as these, was appalled at the conditions prevailing at Redding. Mr. Bowers, with his father, was the principal counsel for Roosevelt in the Barnes case.

"At the examination of the tax books at Redding the fact was disclosed that all property belonging to one person was assessed as a whole, even though detached, so that it was quite impossible to determine the valuation of different parcels of land.

Sanford Osborne has woodland abutting Mr. Lutgen's, but there was no evidence obtainable as to what value had been placed definitely on that particular piece. William Henry Hill has a small parcel of woodland which bears a tax at \$10 per acre. Lutgen bought about 90 acres of his woodland from Floyd Wood, at about \$80 per acre, and it previously bore a tax at about that rate and with heavy timber on it. Mr. Lutgen acquired it as sprout land. Farming property at Great Neck, L. I., within 35 minutes of New York is assessed at lower rates than that which is placed on my farming land. Think what the accumulated taxes would amount to if this property were finally sold in the future generation for building lots.

"I have asked no favors from the board of relief. I don't want any favors. If the board of relief contend that such property is not over assessed, then let them move all property to a suburban rate of values. Mr. Lutgen's daughter's house goes in for nearly twice what Sanford Osborne's house does. The property that is occupied by Samuel Shaw goes in for \$10,000 with all outbuildings and the improvements. Florence Lutgen's daughter's house goes in the old Howard Sherman's homestead. Note the difference between her assessment and that of the Shaws, Barnetts and Herbert Barnes. Daniel Sanford is assessed in greater proportion than other farmers. It looks political. Mr. Bowers did not have time to go over all the tax books to reveal these glaring discriminations.

But to his mind and mine it seems as if there were great indifference to the rate imposed on Mr. Lutgen and myself. We are convinced that no court would sustain such classification of values as appears on the tax books."

England May Exclude Imports From Germany

London, March 2—The Daily News learns that the inner circle of the cabinet will recommend the incorporation of the budget of an announcement that German imports would be prohibited after the war and also that measures will be taken, probably in the nature of preferential duties for the purpose of encouraging exports of the British colonies to the countries of allies. No decision is likely to be reached in the matter, adds the newspaper, until it has been considered by the entire cabinet as well as by the economic conference of which Reginald McKenna, Chancellor of the Exchequer, announced in his speech at the Guild Hall yesterday.

Say Germans Lost 130,000 At Verdun

Paris, March 2—The exact figures of the French losses at Verdun have been given to the committee of the military affairs of the chamber of deputies by Colonel Boucabelle, chief secretary to General Gallieni, minister of war. It is stated that they were 130,000.

The Petit Parisien says that the German losses to date in the Verdun fighting amount to between 125,000 and 130,000 and constitute about one-third of the German effectives actively employed.

Commerce Raiders To War on Armed Ships

Amsterdam, March 2—Captain Peruss, naval expert of the Berlinger Tageblatt, discussing in today's issue of that newspaper the German campaign against merchant shipping, makes the assertion that it will be carried out, not so much through the medium of submarines whose activities are hampered by diplomatic difficulties as through disguised commerce raiders, like the Mowee, which already has sunk a number of vessels of the allies and which sent the Appam to Newport News with a prize crew.
