Coroner Takes Ante-Mortem Statement of Bartholomew Lombardo

In the Bridgeport hospital late today Coroner John J. Phelan took the ante-mortem statement of Bartholomew Lombardo, who is in a dying condition from a bullet wound extending from his groin to his bladder which he sustained on the morning of Feb. 27.

Minnito, who was arrested last night, was arraigned in the city court today on a charge of assault with intent to kill and his case continued until Saturday under bonds of \$5,000 which he was unable to furnish.

He claims he met Minnito in a Hallett street saloon last night and after several drinks with him invited him to spend the night in the shack where he lives in East avenue near the Remington Arms plant.

On this club Capt. John H. Redgate working with a squad of police found Minnito at his lodging house as he was preparing for bed.

White Plains, N. Y., March 14.—The trial of Thomas Mott Osborne, former warden of Sing Sing, under an indictment charging perjury in connection with investigations of his administration, was resumed in the supreme court here today.

Joseph Rotalla, paroled after serving a Sing Sing term, was called as the first witness. Rotalla was a member of the Mutual Welfare League Judiciary Board which tried and convicted officers of the league who had confessed to immorality.

George Holman, another member of the board, Rotalla admitted, "I moved the records from the room" because they believed that it would be a "lost" thing if the records were torn up.

He said, however, that he did not know positively if they were destroyed. Rotalla, under cross-examination, admitted that before he appeared as a witness before the grand jury he was informed that a convicted lawyer was told what his punishment would be if he failed to testify before the jury.

Willard Thompson, who, while serving a sentence for grand larceny, was clerk of the league's judicial board, and took stenographic notes of the proceedings in the Welfare court's trial of immorality charges, corroborated the testimony of previous witnesses to the effect that Osborne told prisoners that the notes were "lost."

On cross-examination Thompson stuck to the story. William Willett, who testified yesterday for the defense, he denied he told one Rapalyea, a school teacher convicted, that unless he testified against Osborne he would be transferred to the Clinton Prison, the most dreaded of all state penal institutions.

Mr. Burt Osborne's counsel, deposed a report current in the courtroom that these alleged warnings by Willett to prospective witnesses were transcribed from stenographic records obtained by means of a telephonic device which District Attorney Wagoner recently announced he had discovered installed in his office.
