OIL-CARRYING SHIPS BANNED

London, April 20—A Copenhagen despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. says that Danish shipowners have been informed that in future the British government will not allow Danish ships to make contracts for carrying oil unless permission of the British authorities is received in advance. Failure to regard this rule will result in a refusal by England to supply coal. Certificates giving the required permission must be signed by British consuls.

A central bureau to distribute paper to all newspapers and periodicals has been established in Berlin.

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N. Y. LEGISLATURE ADJOURNS AFTER A BUSY SESSION

Albany, N. Y., April 20.—Passage of preparedness legislation and of financial reform measures have marked the session of the legislature which closes today.

The usual wide variety of legislative subjects was pretty thoroughly covered in more than 3,100 measures considered, but an exceptionally large number of bills failed of enactment. The preparedness measures which were successful provide for the adoption of a plan for physical and military training in the public schools, the appropriation of \$10,000,000 for emergency purposes of the national guard or for the mobilization of the entire militia for field exercises this summer and the enactment of recommendations of the adjutant general's office designed to increase the personnel and efficiency of the state troops.

Gov. Whitman's recommendations received only partial recognition. His nominations to public office were all confirmed but his recommendations that the board of port wardens and the department of fiscal supervisors of state charities be abolished and the state nautical school turned over to the federal government were defeated. Virtually all of the proposed constitutional amendments defeated at the polls last year were considered either in committee or in open session. The only important ones that received approval were the proposals to provide for woman suffrage and to give constitutional sanction to legislative budgets.

Sources of indirect revenue were increased by the continuing of the 23 per cent liquor license, excise and by amendment to the inheritance, secured debt and corporation tax laws. No taxes were levied on motion picture films which also were made subject to state censorship. Numerous amendments to the labor laws were enacted. One which was fought vigorously would give the state industrial commission wider latitude in constraining the industrial code and also would permit women under restrictions to work an additional number of hours.

ELEVEN KILLED WHEN TORNADO HITS 2 STATES

Kansas City, Mo., April 20.—Eleven persons were reported dead today and scores injured, several seriously, in a series of tornadoes which swept through the central portions of Eastern Kansas and western Missouri last night. Property damage is believed to be heavy, although accurate information was unavailable early today because of disabled telegraph and telephone service.

The storm areas centered north of Wilson county in Kansas across the Missouri line into the border counties. Among the reported dead are: Ruth Fairbanks, seven; Dr. C. D. Bowen, of Appleton City, Mo.; Elmer Packard, of Enterprise, Kan., killed while trying to outrun the storm, automobile overturned. Six persons are reported dead and about 50 injured in Stover, Morgan county, Mo. A special train was sent from Eldon, Mo., to the relief of the stricken populace of Stover. Among other damage the railway station is said to have been blown across the track, blocking traffic.

ON WAY TO TESTIFY AS MATERIAL WITNESS, LOMBARDI COLLAPSES

On the way to the city court to appear as a material witness in the case of Francesco Minniti, aged 64, 753 Pembroke street, who murderously assaulted him a month ago, Bartholmeo Lombardi, age 35, of East avenue, collapsed in the corridor of city court this morning. He was taken seriously ill as the result of poisonous infection caused by a bullet.

Lombardi was taken to Bridgeport hospital in the emergency ambulance. He is in a serious condition. In city court the case of his assailant, charged with assault with intent to kill, was continued until May 13. Bonds were fixed at \$5,000. The assault occurred after a card game in a saloon near Hamilton and Pembroke streets. Lombardi refused to loan Minniti money and he was assaulted. Lombardi is wanted by the police of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., on charge of assault with intent to kill. After he testifies he will be turned over to the authorities of Poughkeepsie.

New Haven Road Asks To Fill Under Trestle

Old Lyme, Conn., April 20.—Notices have been received by the town officials of a public hearing which will be held in the United States engineers office in New London on May 17th on an application by the New York, New Haven & Hartford railroad for permission to replace by a solid fill the present trestle carrying its tracks across Lieutenant river in this town and provide a new channel for the said river, 50 feet wide and six feet deep at mean low water, beginning at a point about 250 feet northerly of the trestle and extending westerly parallel with the railroad tracks to the Connecticut river.

BRYAN SUDDENLY CALLED ON ERRAND TO CAPITAL

New Orleans, April 20.—William J. Bryan, who was to have delivered an address before the Southern Conference for Education and Industry here today, telegraphed last night that he would not be able to fill the engagement because his presence was required in Washington.

Mr. Bryan's telegram, which came from Terre Haute, Ind., gave no further reason as to his sudden change of plans.
