BIG IMPROVEMENT WILL BE MADE IN LOCAL GARBAGE PLANT

Expenditures amounting to \$50,000 will be made on the city garbage plant in order that 200 tons of garbage may be disposed of daily. Charles C. Fisher has been awarded the contract for disposing of the refuse for ten years and final articles with the city were signed Saturday.

PROMINENT CITIZENS APATHATIC TO NEEDS OF CITY, SAYS MARSH

Arthur M. Marsh, a member of the City Planning Commission, in speaking before the Men's club of the United Congregational church yesterday, criticized the apathy existing in Bridgeport among the industrial and financial heads.

Mr. Marsh stated that few men who have died of late years, leaving large estates, have bequeathed any money for city improvements. There are many big men in the city, according to Mr. Marsh, who do not even know the name of the alderman of their district.

Because the City Planning Commission conflicted with some of the administration's political ideas the original appropriation was cut from \$5,000 to \$1,000 during the second year's work and will have to eventually be aided by private subscription if its work is to be continued, he said.

The commission is likely to recommend that when condemning property for streets and other public improvements the city take all the property of which a part is condemned and then resell it and restrict its use; also that areas of the city be restricted against factory or detrimental purposes. The fact that garages and factories are now permitted to rise in residential sections was deprecated by Mr. Marsh.
