MOOSE VICTORY IN FAILURE TO INDORSE HUGHES

Bitter Row in New York State Meeting is Pleasing to Democrats.

New York, July 24—Anti-Hughes Progressives who returned home yesterday from the meeting of the state committee at Syracuse, which adjourned Saturday night without indorsing the Republican candidate for President, asserted that they had won a decisive victory.

Bainbridge Colby, one of the earliest of the returning stragglers from the latest Armageddon, after cooling off from the heat of battle, said that the question was a stormy one, but that was expected in view of the announced purpose of the meeting.

The collapse of the efforts to indorse the Republican candidate was dramatic. Every parliamentary device and expedient was exhausted, but it simply couldn't be done.

N. Y. Progressives Now in Line. "The New York Progressives now take their place along with the Progressives of Massachusetts, California, New Jersey, Michigan, Indiana, Kentucky, Missouri and the lengthening list of other states which have repudiated the national committee.

"The national committee has been spurned and cast away as an unauthoritative organ of the Progressive body, and the predictions and warnings that its action on July 26 would be repudiated have come home to roost with a vengeance.

Michael Schaap, vice chairman of the committee who was also one of the leaders of the opposition to Hughes, declared the meeting was "very successful on the whole." "The Hughes men," he said, "took an adjournment to save their faces, because it was evident that if the resolution indorse Hughes had been put to a vote, it would have been defeated overwhelmingly. The noise and confusion of the meeting did not indicate that we did not know what we were doing."

"I believe that the entire party will support Justice Seabury this morning, no matter what our differences on national questions may be. The Syracuse meeting did not sound the death knell of the Progressive party. We shall still be united in state politics. If the Seabury indorsement had been put to the vote every member of the committee would have voted for him."

Perkins Is Silent. George W. Perkins would not be interviewed as the effect of the Syracuse meeting when a reporter made efforts to reach him by telephone at his home in Riverdale. At the Democratic national headquarters in the Forty-second street building the outcome of the meeting was hailed as a victory for President Wilson.



Catches Prisoner Who Escaped Jail

Field, July 24—After having enjoyed the freedom from prison life for nearly two weeks William McMahon has been returned to the county jail, Bridgeport, by Deputy Sheriff William Gould of Fairfield. McMahon escaped from that institution two weeks ago and his whereabouts were not known until Saturday. The police of every town were notified of his escape and a wide search was being made for his capture. Sheriff Gould learned Saturday that McMahon had been working for John P. Morehouse of Greenfield Hill and went to the home and arrested him.

Think Bremen Can't Be Near U. S. Coast; British Patrol Active

Norfolk, Va., July 24—Only one of the allied warships patrolling the Virginia capes waiting for the German underwater liner Deutschland, or her sister ship, Bremen, was in sight early today, and she was cruising far out to sea. Seafaring men who had been expecting the arrival of the Bremen within the last two days now say she cannot be anywhere near the capes.
