COST TOO MUCH, NEWTOWN DROPS ALL EXTRA COPS

Quarantine Restrictions Against Polio Carriers Are Modified.

(Special to The Farmer.) Newtown, Aug. 1.—Beginning today the board of health has ordered withdrawal of the officers and inspectors patrolling the railroad stations and principal roadways leading to Newtown.

Hence it was decided to give up patrolling roads and try posting the town with quarantine notices, warning all persons not to bring in or locate children under 16 years in any domicile or habitation in Newtown under a penalty of \$500 for infraction of the rule.

In case of war with Mexico, the name of the fund is to be changed to the "American British, French, Belgian Permanent Blind Relief War Fund."
