gas works in the state. The "Rutland Gas Light Co." so-called, was organized some fifteen years ago.

Their works were built by H. Q. Hawley, and were run some seven years when they were destroyed by fire; the works were re built and again burned a few years after. The gas made by the old company was manufactured from rosin and afterwards from petroleum, and but little profit was made in the operation. In October, 1867, the People's Gas Light Co. was organized and works were built upon the old site on Union street, and operations begun in November of that year.
