The Supreme Bench.
 The latest reports concerning the im-
 pending vacancies in the supreme court
 are that Circuit Judge Wm. Woods, of
 Montgomery, Ala., (a native of Ohio)
 will succeed Justice Stone; that Stan-
 ley Matthews will be appointed as
 Justice Swayne's successor; that Ator-
 ney General Devans will have to wait
 for Justice Clifford's death or resigna-
 tion, and that Senator Edmunds will
 be given a seat on the supreme bench by
 the retirement of Justice Hunt, provided
 a bill be passed by congress authorizing
 Hunt to retire upon full pay in advance
 of his attaining the age now requisite
 under existing general law. It is, how-
 ever, very improbable that two addition-
 al Ohio men will be elected as associates
 on the bench with Chief Justice Waite,
 and as between Stanley Matthews and
 Judge Woods, the former has the best
 chances for preference. Justice Cliff-
 ord's death may be expected at any
 time, as he is afflicted both with soft-
 ening of the brain and paralysis. He is
 now unable to dictate a complete sen-
 tence, and therefore cannot tender his
 resignation, unless an unexpected im-
 provement in his health should occur.
 Justice Hunt's condition is also very
 precarious. He has the softening of the
 brain and like Justice Clifford he can-
 not sign his name. He would have re-
 signed long ago had his pecuniary
 circumstances, apart from his salary,
 been sufficient to comfortably support
 his family.

Editorial Deadheading.
 "Old Hill," of Dallas (Cal.) *Index*,
 gets off the following in regard to edi-
 torial deadheading: "One of the beauties
 and charms of the editor's life is
 his deadheading it on all occasions.
 No one who has ever tasted the sweets
 of that bliss can begin to take in its
 glory and happiness. He does \$100
 worth of advertising for a railroad, gets
 a "pass" for a year, and rides \$25 worth,
 and then he is looked upon as a dead-
 head, or a half-blown "dead beat." He
 "puffs a theatre or concert troupe \$10
 worth and gets \$1 in "complimentary,"
 and is thus passed in "free." If the hall
 is crowded he is begrudged the room he
 occupies—for if the "complimentaries
 were paying tickets the troupe would
 be so much in pocket. He blows and
 puffs a church festival free to any de-
 sired extent, and does the poster printing
 at half rates, and rarely gets a thank
 you for it. It goes in as a part of his
 duty as an editor. He does more work
 gratuitously for the town and commu-
 nity than all the rest of the population,
 and gets cured for it all; but a man
 who donates a dollar for a Fourth of
 July, base ball club or church is grate-
 fully remembered. Oh, it is a sweet
 thing to be an editor. He "passes free"
 you know."

Very Proper Advice.
 The democratic party will at least
 learn from this campaign that to succeed
 it must have principles and maintain
 them, and that its platform must cover
 all the states alike. It must learn
 that to carry Maine it cannot become a
 rag money party; and to save a district
 or two in Pennsylvania it cannot afford
 to stultify itself with protective alli-
 ances. In short, it must quit being all
 things to all men, but must plant itself
 upon the truths of experience and win
 political economy. A party which will
 not unhesitatingly reject dishonest ex-
 pedients and stand by its principles has no
 real existence and ought to die at
 once.—St. Louis Times.

A Crushing Rejoinder.
 A bigoted partisan Democrat,
 made a harangue in Congress, in which
 he brazenly insisted that the vast ex-
 penditures and burdens of the war for the
 Union were properly chargeable to the
 Republican party. He was loudly ap-
 plauded by the doughfaces and some of
 the brigadiers. General Garfield im-
 mediately replied with crushing weight
 of argument, and a few words of his
 answer are well worth quoting: "I de-
 sire to ask that gentleman and his party
 one question. Suppose that in the year
 1861 every Democrat north of the Po-
 tomac and the Ohio had followed the
 lead of Grant, of Sherman, of Douglas,
 and Dix and Dickinson, and Brough and
 Tod and other great lights of the Dem-
 ocratic party; had thrown away the
 Democratic name; said they would be
 Democrats no longer, as we said we
 would be Republicans no longer, but
 all would be Union men, and stand
 together around the flag until the Re-
 bellion had been put under our feet.
 I desire to ask the gentlemen, if these
 things had happened how long the war
 would have lasted, and how much the
 war would have cost? I do not hesitate
 to say that it could not have lasted six
 months and the expenditures of the war
 would never have exceeded \$100,000,000.
 I say as a matter of current history,
 that it was the great hope of the re-
 bels of the South that the assistance
 of the Democratic party of the North
 would divide our forces and overcome
 all our efforts; that at the ballot-box
 the Democrats at home would help the
 cause which they were maintaining in
 the field. It was that, and that alone,
 which protracted the war and created
 our immense debt. I come, therefore,
 to the door of your party, gentlemen,
 to the other side, and lay down at your
 threshold every dollar of the debt,
 every item of the stupendous total
 which expresses the great cost of the
 war; and I say if you had followed
 Douglas there would have been no debt,
 no blood, no burden."

 Thirty pairs of embroidered slippers
 are necessary for the trousseau of a Chi-
 nese lady of position, and her boudoir
 is crammed with confectionery, dried
 fruits, burnt almonds, barley sugar, syr-
 up of aloes, oranges, ginger, and shad-
 docks, in confusion with rich silks, jew-
 els of wrought gold and precious stones,
 rings, bracelets, cases of nails, bodkins

 nacks. In this strange country a
 young girl when she marries never has
 a dowry. She is literally purchased
 either by the husband himself or by his
 relations. Although she may have no
 brothers, she cannot inherit any portion
 of her paternal fortune unless her father
 makes an express declaration in her
 favor. Such arrangements are always
 completed before the marriage, and are
 usually completed by agents, called
 "Medjin." The young fiancée is next
 presented to her husband's parents.
 The husband himself she never sees
 until the wedding day, when she is
 carried in a closed chair to the house.
 The key of the chair is handed to the
 bridegroom, who opens the door, and if
 the lady within pleases his taste he
 holds his hand out to her; if not, he
 slams the door, and the engagement is
 at an end, the girl's parents having the
 right to retain the purchase money.

Scientific Scraps.
 Red ink is a solution of alum colored
 with Brazil wood, or ammoniacal solu-
 tion of cochineal.
 Split timber is more durable and
 stronger than that which is sawn, from
 the continuity of the fibers.
 Plate glass is formed of silica seven-
 ty-eight parts, potash two, soda thirteen,
 lime five and alumina two parts.
 The recent scientific exploration of
 the lake of Tiberias by Mons. Lortet
 has resulted in the discovery of several
 new forms of fish and new species of
 mollusks in this celebrated lake.
 Old wine says Macagno, owes its
 mellowness to the increase of glycerine
 more than to a decrease of tannin in the
 liquid. The "keeping" of the wine, he
 maintains, depends upon the proportion
 the alcohol bears to the tannin.
 A mixture of three parts of salicylic
 acid and eighty-seven parts alicic
 of magnesia is said to be not only a
 remedy for sweating of the feet, but
 when rubbed over the whole body, on
 the authority of Dr. Kohunou, a cure
 for night sweating by consumptives.
 Dr. Julius Schmidt has lately pub-
 lished that he finds from observations
 of the red spot on Jupiter, during a
 period extending from 1879 to 1880,
 that an interval of 9 hours 55 minutes

34.4 seconds represents the rotation of
 that planet upon its own axis. But he
 is not quite sure about the matter after
 all, and like a wise and prudent man
 wants confirmatory evidence.
 Herr E. Schone, in the *Berichte*,
 does not attach any scientific value
 whatever to the ordinary potassium
 iodine paper tests as ozone measures.
 A small amount of ozone in moist air
 produces, he says, a greater degree of
 color on potassium iodide papers than a
 larger amount of ozone in dry air. The
 humidity of the air and the hygroscopic
 character of the material from which
 the paper is made therefore largely
 influence the depth of the color pro-
 duced. He even goes so far as to assert
 that the actual presence of ozone in the
 atmosphere is at present an open ques-
 tion.

The minute lines and furrows on per-
 sons' hands are likely to receive a far
 more useful attention than the observa-
 tion of the great lines by fortune-tellers.
 There is a reason to believe that the
 spiral whorls on the thumb and finger
 points are peculiar to individuals and
 races, and may be certainly used to
 define the ethnological class or positive
 identification of the being, possessing
 them as the measurements of the skull
 or examination of a photograph would
 be. Dr. Henry Faulds of Tunkiji Hos-
 pital, Tokio, Japan, in an interesting
 letter in *The Nature*, directs attention
 to this subject in a way which will
 attract the notice of naturalists and stu-
 dents of the theory of development
 and heredity.
