George W. Vaughn, Esq., one of Portland's oldest citizens, died at his residence in this city on Sunday morning, aged sixty-four years.

The grand select ball given by Prof. Halpruner, the popular dancing master, on last Tuesday evening, at City Rifles' Hall, in honor of the marriage of his brother, Dr. W. S. Halpruner, with Miss Carrie Lieb, of this city, was in every respect a complete success, and one of the most enjoyable affairs of the season. The hall was literally crowded with the friends of the happy pair. After the ceremony and congratulations were concluded, dancing was commenced and indulged in to a late hour, every one enjoying to the full the pleasures of the dance.

The brutal and cowardly murder which was perpetrated a short distance from this city on Friday night, has been the theme for wonder and comment during the week. The sickening details have been so often given that we will not here mention them further than to state that the victim, Fred Hall, was a couple of masked men, who destroyed every trace of their deed by burning the cabin wherein the man was sleeping at the time. His companion, a forced spectator to the horrible scene, reported the facts to the police, who, on their way to the place, found only the charred remains of the cabin and a few bones of the murdered man. No clue as yet to the murderers or the motives that prompted the crime.

The ratification meeting in this city on Monday evening lost nothing in numbers and enthusiasm because it was so long delayed. Oro Fino Hall was appropriately decorated, and patriotic speeches were interspersed with patriotic music and thunders of applause. The following telegram from Hon. J. H. Mitchell was read: "Rutherford B. Hayes, of Ohio, was today publicly inaugurated President in presence of the largest and most orderly concourse of people ever assembled in Washington. His inaugural was received with enthusiastic applause. I attended both of Grant's inaugurations, the number present to-day is largely in excess of that of either of those occasions. A great controversy has resulted in a great victory to the Republic. The people of the nation have reason to be grateful." The meeting was addressed by Hon. J. F. Caples, Hon. H. W. Scott, Hon. M. C. George, G. W. Yocum, Esq., O. P. MacGeorge, Esq., and others. The meeting was one of the largest and most enthusiastic ever held in Portland.

The Seattle Tribune says: Mr. P. D. Forbes, who was released from custody in Victoria on giving bonds in the sum of \$10,000, has gone to California in quest of Thorp and Leathers. From them he hopes to get the notes for the giving of which he was adjudged to be in contempt of court, on the return of which to the legal authorities he and his bondsmen will be released from further holding.

The insane asylum, under Dr. J. C. Hawthorne's proprietorship, continues a model institution. The number of inmates is larger than usual. Mr. John Kenworthy has been the successful warder of over twelve years. Mrs. Kenworthy, the matron, has a large experience in such institutions in California and elsewhere.

Philip Ritz, of Walla Walla, has just returned from Los Angeles, where he has established a nursery of 50,000 trees. He made one shipment of 20,000 peach trees alone from Delaware, and will have at his nursery at Walla Walla this season 500,000, which is probably the largest and best stock of trees on this coast.
